demonstrated talk on "Dental Care" by Dr. Lloyd E. Griffin, Jr., of Elizabeth City. Dr. Griffin is a member of the State Dental Society's Rural Health Committee and is interested in over-all health improvement projects and practices throughout the state and especially in this area.

Glenn Brosier, field representative for the American Red Cross, stationed at Elizabeth City, will lead the discussion of "Community Health Services" by explaining the various services available through the local Red Cross Chapters, especially the Blood Bank program. S. L. Lowery, farm agent in Pasquotank County, will moderate a panel of resource persons who will interpret other available community health services. The home demonstration leaders have been most helpful in getting health information to lay leaders in rural North Carolina, and Miss Edna Bishop, home agent in Elizabeth City, will review some of the health programs and activities of the club women in Pasquotank County on this panel.

Max Sheeley, Hospital Administrator, Elizabeth City, will be another panel member. The Farm Bureau and Ruritan Clubs in this area have been active in community health programs and these organizations will also be represented on the afternoon program.

The physicians have always taken the lead in promoting better health and medical care for the people in North Carolina. In summarizing the conference program, Dr. Zack D. Owens of Elizabeth City will focus attention on "Why Your Family Physician Is Interested In Community Health Protection." While president of the State Medical Society, Dr. Owens gave his full support and cooperation to the expansion of the rural health education program of the state society. It was during his term in office that the society's Committee on Rural Health and Education agreed to sponsor regional rural health conferences and since that time district conferences, such as the one being held in Edenton on January 15, were scheduled.

All civic and community club leaders are being urged to attend the afternoon conference at the armory in Edenton and to bring any other interested persons so as to help stimulate more and more local participation in health improvement activities.

the highest percentage of damage and which were too wet and heavy to be "blown out" at the time of picking.

In some instances it may be possible to reduce the damage in the peanuts picked from the top and outer portion of the stack to 7 per cent or less, thus increasing their market and loan value substantially.

Helene W. Nixon, Perquimans County ASC Office Manager, reported that further information as to how this change will be applied to farm-storage loans and purchase agreements will be furnished as soon as available.
