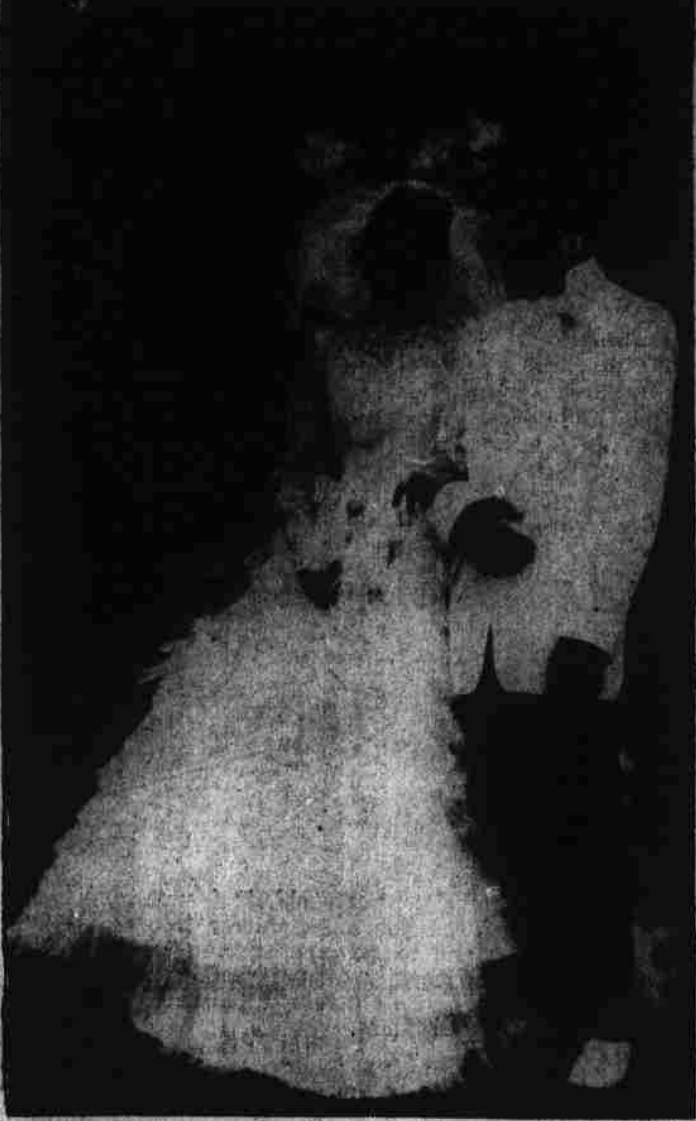
CIRCLE TO MEET
