PERQUIMANS SCHOOL POLICIES

This is the second of a series of articles relating policies adopted for the operation of Perquimans County Schools by the County Board of Education:

301. Due to a shortage of teachers, a motion was made, seconded and passed authorizing the employment and retirement of teachers after a study of each individual case, and not because of a definite age limit, provided there is no conflict with the retirement laws of North Carolina. April 6, 1959.

302. The election of currently employed principals shall be held not later than the regular Board meeting in April. March 3, 1960.

303. The election of currently employed teachers shall be held not later than the regular Board meeting in May. March 3, 1960.

304. All personnel employed on a twelve month basis shall be given a two weeks' vacation with pay each fiscal year, plus the following holidays: (1) Labor Day, (2) Thanksgiving and the following Friday, (3) December 24, 25 and 26, (4) July 4. The superintendent shall have

the authority to approve vacation schedules. March 3, 1960.

305. The election of all personnel other than principals and teachers shall be held prior to the opening of school. April 6, 1960.

306. The superintendent is authorized to replace any person known to be pregnant as soon as suitable replacement can be employed; but not later than the fourth month. The teacher concerned is requested to notify the principal or superintendent just as soon as her condition is confirmed by her family doctor. August 1, 1960.

Students

401. All pupils entering the first grade must present a birth certificate to the principal before they are permitted to be enrolled. May 25, 1951.

402. It is the policy of this Board to request the withdrawal of any student who marries during their period as a student in the school system. Their application to re-enter school will be considered when received in writing. If accepted, the student must agree not to participate in any extra-curricular ac-

tivities, including sports of all kinds.

403. In accordance with State Board of Education regulations, all children to be eligible for entrance in the first grade must have reached the sixth birthday on or before October 16th of the year in which they are to be enrolled. June 29, 1959.

404. The superintendent is given the authority to assign students to and accept students from other school administrative units on a temporary basis until the next meeting of the Board of Education. June 29, 1959.

405. Students known to be pregnant shall not be permitted to attend school. June 29, 1959.

406. The superintendent shall have the authority to expel a student upon the written report or request of the student's principal. All such expulsions shall be reported to the Board of Education. June 29, 1959.

407. The principals of the high schools are authorized to set aside a smoking area on the school grounds for high school students. These areas and rules and regulations must be approved by the superintendent. June 29, 1959.

408. Students will not be permitted to leave the school property during the lunch hour. June 29, 1959.

School Property.
301. All persons desiring to use the school cafeteria for private dinners or for other private purposes will be required to pay a fee of \$3.00 for the purpose of paying light bills and janitorial service. The individual reserving the lunch room will be responsible for any damage caused by the affair. August 1, 1959.

North Carolina Egg Producers Study Ways Of Boosting Sales

The North Carolina Egg Marketing Program is beginning to take shape, thanks to funds being contributed by egg producers.

A committee representing the N. C. Egg Industry and N. C. Poultry Council met recently at State College to discuss possible ways of launching the program. Here are things they agreed to study:

- (1) Programs with supermarkets.
- (2) Programs with chain store councils, restaurant associations, baker associations, food handlers, and similar groups.
- (3) Programs of national scope such as March Egg Month with poultry and egg national board.
- (4) Programs of "spot" adver-

ting with radio, newspapers and magazines.

(5) Merchandise programs through seal identification of high quality North Carolina eggs.

(6) Cooperative programs with N. C. State College and N. C. Department of Agriculture.

(7) Newsletters to inform egg producers of activities.

Definite proposals for enacting a program will be presented to the egg industry in the near future. The object of such a program will be to sell more North Carolina eggs.

Coastal Ferry Resume Service

Free ferry service between Hatteras and Ocracoke Islands is being gradually restored to normal, according to an announcement by the State Highway Commission.

Until Thursday of last week the ferry operation had been restricted to two round trips daily because of Hurricane Donna damage but a five round trip per day schedule has now been placed in effect.

Under the new schedule, ferries leave the southern tip of Hatteras Island at 6:45, 7:30 and 10:00 A. M., and at 12:30 and 3:00 P. M. Ferries now leave Ocracoke at 6:45, 8:30 and 11:00 A. M., and at 1:30 and 5:00 P. M. Highway officials noted that the normal winter schedule of ferry service connecting Hatteras and Ocracoke will be announced shortly and will become effective on October 1.
