December 12th is Referendum Day for many farmers in Eastern North Carolina in that they will be given an opportunity to vote on that day on the continuation of the peanut assessment, the continuation of the assessment for Tobacco Associates, on the tobacco quotas and on cotton quotas. This is a definite advantage to the growers in that the four referenda are combined and all of them can be voted on in one trip. The peanut assessment idea, whereby growers could vote to assess themselves and use the funds thus derived to promote the production, marketing and consumption of peanuts was first put into effect in Virginia at 1c per 100 pounds. Then in 1953, North Carolina voted in 1c per 100 pounds. Seeing the need for increased funds, the peanut growers in 1955 in North Carolina increased their assessment to 2c per 100 pounds. In 1957, Alabama, seeing the successes in North Carolina and Virginia, voted to assess themselves 5c per 100 gia, seeing the advantages, voted to assess themselves 5c per 100 pounds. Texas and Oklahoma are now in the process of getting legislation passed so that they too will be able to assess themselves and raise funds to promote their peanuts.

The fact that Georgia, Alabama, Texas and Oklahoma are coming in on the assessment basis, following North Carolina treasurer of FHA and presided and Virginia, is certainly endorsement to the success of the program.
