

SENATOR ERVIN SAYS

One of the important ceremonies of every new year is the administration of the oath of office to those members qualifying by election or appointment. Twelve new Senators are scheduled to be sworn in for the first time at the opening of the 88th Congress. This constitutes one of the largest turnovers I have witnessed since I have been in the Senate. More important, however, is the fact that the tragic deaths of Senators Kerr and Chavez, both powerful Committee Chairmen, have struck heavy blows to the Senate's leaders. Respectively, they headed the Aeronautical and Space Sciences and the Public Works Committee. Their deaths are certain to have a far-reaching effect on the affairs of the Senate.

New Senators are: Bayh, Brewster, Dominick, Inouye, Kennedy, McGovern, McIntyre, Meehan, Nelson, Ribicoff and Simpson. Senator Kerr's successor has not been named at the time of this writing.

The oath taking ceremony is brief and simple. It is fundamental to the working of the parliamentary government and democracy. It requires at the inception of office holding a dedication to the principles of constitutional government.

As Congress opens, I am impressed by the fact that while the Senate is a continuing parliamentary body, its membership is ever-changing. In addition to the lives of Senator Kerr and Chavez, death struck down Senators Dworshak, Case, Schoepel, and Bridges during the 87th Congress. There were four retirements from office by Senators Butler, Bush, Long of Hawaii, and Smith of Massachusetts. Five Senators were defeated in their bid for re-election. Senators Bottum, Carroll, Capehart, Hickey, and Wiley will vacate their seats.

The defeat of Senators Wiley and Capehart reshuffles the rankings of the minority members of the Judiciary and the Banking and Currency Committees, where they had top rank. Seniority determines committee membership, rankings and chairmanships by Senator custom.

All these changes will have an important bearing on the issues for this session which include new and holdover problems. Economic and tax policies, transportation and farm measures, education and medical care proposals are channeled through the Senate's seventeen standing committees. The make-up of most committees will be affected by these deaths, retirements, and political defeats. I expect no changes to be made in my Committee assignments. Currently, I hold membership on the Armed Services, Government Operations, and Judiciary Committees. I have Chairmanships of Judiciary Subcommittees on Constitutional Rights and Revision and Codification of the Statutes of the

3. The grand and reserve champion pens and grand and reserve champion individual hogs in both the junior and adult divisions will be sold separately. All other hogs will be conveniently grouped and sold in "decks" according to U. S. grades.

4. No. 3 hogs cannot be entered in the show. No. 2 hogs will not be eligible for premiums.

5. Animals are eligible to compete in only one class. Each exhibitor is limited to one entry in each class if all classes are participated in. No person can exhibit more than 9 hogs.

6. All entries must be approved by county agent or vocational teacher before entry is made.

7. Each exhibitor or buyer assumes all liabilities in case of sickness, death or injury to his animals. The exhibitor is responsible until the animal is

sold at which time the buyer assumes the liability.

8. All animals must be shown by their owner except when an exhibitor has two animals in the judging ring at the same time.

9. Each 4-H or FFA exhibitor must submit an up-to-date project book record book at the time his animal is weighed in at the show.

10. In order to compete for premiums, all animals must be in place not later than 12 noon March 6.

11. The grand and reserve champion pens and grand and reserve champion individual hogs in both the junior and adult divisions will be sold separately. All other hogs will be conveniently grouped and sold in "decks" according to U. S. grades.

12. All animals entered in the show must be sold.

Peanut production in North Carolina is estimated at 347,600,000 pounds compared with 309,700,000 pounds produced in 1961 and is the largest total production attained since 1956.

The record yield per acre of 1,975 pounds is 12 percent above last year and surpasses the previous high of 1,860 pounds produced in 1958 by 6 percent. This year's crop was produced on 176,000 acres, the same as in 1961.
