

FOR SOCIAL SECURITY

When you have income from your farm of \$500 or more, you can get Social Security credits if you had a loss in 1951. This means farmers can build up Social Security protection for themselves and their families.

Farm self-employed tax returns are due by February 15 for those farmers whose tax year starts on January 1. However, farm operations who file an estimate of their tax and pay that amount by January 15 have until April 15 to file their returns and pay any balance due.

Keeping accurate and complete records of all income and expenses is just good business all the time, but it is particularly important when it is time to file income tax returns. Maintaining good records now and filing tax returns on time means quicker processing of your claim when you become eligible for benefits, or, in the event of your death, when your survivors apply for benefits. The amount of your benefit depends on the earnings you report. The tax on 1952 earnings is 4.7 per cent of your net earnings up to \$4800.

If you are going to apply for Social Security benefits this year, it is suggested you have an extra copy of your 1952 Federal Income Tax Return and Schedule F made up for Social Security and bring it with you so you can get credit for all your earnings under Social Security.

Vitamin C Very Helpful To Health

Vitamin C is important to your health! Homemakers concerned about providing their families with all the necessary vitamins and minerals, don't have to worry about Vitamin C during the winter months.

Because of the freeze-in Florida, homemakers will be looking for foods other than citrus to serve their families. Many vegetables contain goodly amounts of Vitamin C. Brussels sprouts, cabbage, potatoes and rutabagas contain Vitamin C are good to serve.

In terms of the cost of this vitamin green leafy vegetables are an excellent buy. Raw cabbage is a substantial and inexpensive source of Vitamin C.

Of course, citrus fruits are one of our best sources of the vitamin. Oranges, grapefruit, lemons and others are high in amount of the vitamin and can be served in many ways during the winter months.
