

### Loss At Per Capita

Hertford and Perquimans County had an estimated fire loss of \$18,195, or about \$1.35 per capita during the year 1962, according to a report released this week by Hertford Fire Chief E. C. "Bobby" Elliott. Thus the 1962 capita loss for the Town of Hertford amounted to only 28 cents. Per capita for the county was only \$1.59.

The department had a total of 28 calls in the county and eight calls in Hertford.

Estimated loss and damage in the county was \$14,620 with the estimated cost of the property involved \$154,300. Fire losses for the Town of Hertford was \$578 and the estimated cost of property involved was \$52,500. The firemen traveled a total of 328 miles, answering all calls during the year. The Hertford fire truck traveled 117 miles, while the county truck traveled 213 miles. The water tanker, an auxiliary used by the firemen on county calls, went to all county fires and Chief Elliott reported the amount of water it

carried resulted in a much smaller loss than would otherwise have been the result.

Only one rescue call was made in the county which resulted in one loss of life due to drowning. The Department worked 21 hours before removing the body from the river.

Chief Elliott reported that a total loss for the past four years in the town was \$6,175, the estimated cost of property involved was \$150,450. For the county the total loss was \$75,245 with the estimated cost of property involved being \$419,820. Thus the per capita loss for the town was 73 cents and the county's per capita loss \$1.98.

### Negro Murderer Caught In Perquimans:

George Riddick, colored, wanted in Virginia for a double murder, was located near Okisco this week but when Pasquotank officers went to make an investigation he disappeared in the woods. Sheriff Winslow was notified on Tuesday afternoon that the man was probably hiding in the woods or swamp on this side of the line between the two counties of Perquimans and Pasquotank. Riddick is said to have murdered a colored woman and a man near Virginia Beach five months ago, and for most of that time has been living near Okisco without suspicion on the part of the people of the community.

### Rural Section Will Probably Get Electricity:

That the rural electrification plan will result in electric current being supplied to at least two, and probably three of the rural section of Perquimans is indicated. Chapanoke residents will probably have a line extended to that neighborhood in the near future and it is highly possible that Belvidere residents will receive this benefit sometime during the summer. New Hope, also will probably secure a line to that community.

### turned To Second Class:

Local office placed in third class during depression; business better, new rating will not be in effect until July 1st. The Hertford Post Office becomes a second class office on July 1, after having for the past five years been third class. The Hertford Post Office ranked third class for many years prior to 1924, when, due to an increase in the business of the office, it was placed in the second class. This continued for only six years, however, and in 1930, as the depression began to be felt in the Town of Hertford, the condition reflected in the post office and business fell off to the extent that the office reverted to third class.

### Enlarged Unit Public Welfare For County:

An enlarged county unit of public welfare is in process of being set up this week in Perquimans, in accordance with a state-wide plan, Miss Ruth Davenport of Elizabeth City, in charge as case worker, under the County Superintendent of Public Welfare F. T. Johnson. Miss Davenport has also arrived and at present has her quarters in the old ERA office in the old Carolina Bank Building. This arrangement however, is only temporary, as the

Board of County Commissioners on Monday authorized the renting of two offices on the second floor of the building occupied by Darden Bros., and on February 1st the Welfare Unit as well as the WPA Unit will occupy these offices.
