

...to the several pro-
grams operated by ASCE in
North Carolina which serve to
increase production of certain
commodities. ASCE operates a
program which was designed
specifically to increase the pro-
duction of wool. George Bell
man, Perquimans County ASCE
Office Manager, explained that
wool is an essential and strate-
gic commodity which is not
produced in sufficient quantity
in the United States. For this
reason, he said, Congress pass-
ed the Wool Act of 1954 which
directed the Secretary of Agricul-
ture to provide an incentive
program which would encourage
an annual production of 300
million pounds of shorn wool.

For the last few years the in-
centive price under the wool
program has been set at 62 cents
per pound for shorn wool. The
program provides that farmers
market wool through the normal
channels obtaining the best pos-
sible price for their production.
At the end of the marketing year,
the Department of Agriculture
determines the average national
price obtained by all wool grow-
ers for their wool. The per-
centage required to bring this
national price up to 62 cent in-
centive level is determined and
all farmers who market wool re-
ceive this percentage increase in
their income from wool sold.

According to Bellman, every
year this program has been in
effect it has served its purpose
by increasing the national pro-
duction of wool. Should the na-
tional average price received by
wool producers throughout the
nation during 1962 reach the 62
cent level the payments will no
longer be necessary.

Bellman cautioned farmers that
April 30, 1963, is the final date
by which they may file applica-
tion for incentive payment for
wool marketed in the 1962 mar-
keting year. The 1962 wool mar-
keting year runs from April 1,
1962 through March 31, 1963.
