Sunday School Lesson

PREPARATION FOR CHRIST'S COMING

International Sunday School Lesson for March 31, 1963.

Lesson Text: Mark 13.

The purpose of today's study standing of Christ's coming and its meaning for our day and

Throughout Hebrew history there was a long succession of prophets who were courageous and dedicated to their God and their country. When these men spoke out, they were warning an entire nation that it was sinning and must repent or else it would suffer God's wrath.

During times of oppression by foreign powers, the prophets needed to arouse the people from their lethargy, but not alarm the foreign rulers. To do this they couched their phophecies in a special style called "apocalyptic." The word means an "uncovering," a "revelation." It disclosed a divine truth, but the truth was presented in a dream or a vision; this was done so the foreign overlords would not understand it.

For their own people, however, the prophets had a message. First, they recounted their history. The people must not be allowed to forget how God had chosen them and led them to the Promised Land, and that ever since he had watched over them, caring for them, disciplining them. Then, when the prophet had reached the point in history where the people were, he would exhort them to action. Having reminded them of their sins, the prophet would call them to repent and seek God's forgiveness. And, finally, the prophet would describe the way God would handle the enemy if Israel would turn away from her sins. There would be signs from heaven—there would be upheavals on earth. Dreadful things would happen to the enemy, and the righteous ones would receive their just reward.

The early church was not allowed to mature without oppo-sition. The early disciples knew the opposition of both religious and civic antagonists. The staggering blows that hit the church sedmed to some to indicate its death. But the New Testament writers did not accept the opposition to God as final. Temporal powers might attempt to ers. But beyond the temporal is the eternal. Organized religion might attempt to bring this new faith to an end, but God is sovereign, and ultimately he will vindicate the faithful.

The New Testament never the New Testament never claims that this world's history will continue eternally. Our history is timebound, it is temporal, and therefore has an end. The signs given in apocalyptic literature (and there are several Books of this type in the Bible) indicate the disroptive nature of Books of this type in the Bible) indicate the disruptive nature of the end. The faithful may have to endure calamity, but beyond the calamity there is God. Christians always live in expectation that God's kingdom will come in its fullness. With eyes of hope we look forward to the complete manifestation of God's sovereign rule.

And how badly we need that hope, when television, radio, newspapers, bring all the world to our doorstep—all the tensions, the strains, the strife of all hu-
