

Participating in Health Contest

There are 56 4-H Club boys and girls participating in the county-wide 4-H King and Queen Health Contest and 24 girls running for Miss Perquimans County.

This activity is being sponsored by the county-wide 4-H leader organization and the Perquimans County Health Committee. The purpose of it is to promote interest among boys and girls in health improvement. This is an activity that every boy and girl conducts along with all 4-H Club projects. They learn to recognize that good health is a part of all projects.

The participants in this contest were examined through the Health Department by the county nurses, Miss Audrey Umphlett and Mrs. Opal Wood. The nurses' recommendations are to be corrected by the participants on or before the 10th of May. Along with this report, they are to submit a record of their health activities carried out during the year. They will be judged according to their reports. The first place winner will be crowned in a special ceremony on the Academy lawn Saturday, May 18 at 3:30 P. M. Following the ceremony, a picnic and banquet will be held.

The P. W. Moore High School Band of Elizabeth City and D. F. Walker High School Band of Edenton will render music for the parade.

Surviving are three sons, William Chaplin Perry of Virginia Beach, Jesse Parker Perry, Jr., of Glenhead, Long Island, N. Y., and Eugene Spruill Perry of Coronado, Calif.; a daughter, Mrs. Nat White of Glen Head, Long Island, N. Y.; a half sister, Mrs. T. N. Bunch of Norfolk; and 11 grandchildren.

Funeral services were held on Sunday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock in the Hertford Baptist Church by Rev. Norman Harris, pastor. Music was softly played during the service by Mrs. Charles Johnson, organist.

The casket was covered with a pall of red carnations and baby's breath. Pallbearers were R. S. Mondis,

April 30 Deadline in Wool Program

Tuesday, April 30, is the last day for filing applications for payment for the 1963 marketing year under the wool payment program.

The payments, to be made this summer, will cover shorn wool and unshorn lambs marketed during the 12-month period April 1, 1962, through March 31 of this year. Later marketings will be eligible for payments for the 1963 marketing year, which began April 1, 1963.

The program payments on wool and lambs will not be made unless the grower files an application which is supported with all the necessary sales records.

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Trailways

There Have Been Some Changes Made

Time was when buses stopped everywhere. Some still do as they are dandy for local trips.

But today there's also a faster kind of Trailways service known as thru express. Thru express takes you great distances without change and with less stops enroute. Many thru trips are made non-stop, and very often a bus will travel 500 miles with only 2 or 3 stops.

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
