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New Parking Meters Now Installed In Hertford Violations To Be Enforced

New Meters Require Nickels and Dimes, No Pennies

The Town of Hertford has installed new parking meters in the congested area to replace the old meters which have been in operation since 1947 and which had begun to give trouble.

The new meters require dimes and nickels and will not take pennies. For a nickel you get an hour's parking, a dime two hours' parking. It is also optional and will take a quarter and give you two hours' time.

The meters, for the convenience of the shoppers, are being placed in the same spots as the old ones. People working in town may utilize the parking area behind the stores and in the additional parking lot behind the Hertford Municipal Building.

Though the new meters are already in operation, violations are not being enforced until Monday, June 24, at which time tickets will be given for over-parking. Violators will have to present their citation at the Hertford Municipal Building, office of the city clerk, and will be required to pay a fine for the violation.

Hertford Post Office Gets ZIP Code Number To Speed Mailing

The Hertford Post Office five-digit ZIP Code is 27944. Postmaster W. W. White has announced,

"Everyone in Hertford will use this ZIP Code on all their correspondence to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance of mis-sent mail," Mr. White said. ZIP Code, the Post Office Department's revolutionary new system of improved mail dispatch and delivery, goes into effect nationally on July 1.

Postmaster White stressed the importance of all citizens of Hertford learning this new ZIP Code and using it in their return address on all correspondence. In announcing this, he said, ZIP Code taken from return address on incoming mail should be used.

"The Zip Code is literally the last word in mail addressing," Mr. White said. "It should follow the city and state in address."

100 Needed To Assist Project In Ecuador

W. C. Strowd, Perquimans County Negro Farm Agent, reports that one hundred persons are needed to assist the Peace Corps-Heifer Project, Inc., program in Ecuador.

This team of Peace Corps Volunteers will include specialists in agronomy, forestry, horticulture, home economics, poultry, as well as persons with general experience in homemaking and farming. Scheduled to begin training this summer they will later join 50 volunteers who have been at work in Ecuador since October 1962.

Married couples are encouraged to apply for Ecuador-Heifer Project if they have no dependent children. While some positions call for college training in agriculture there are many other opportunities for persons with a working knowledge of agriculture and homemaking.

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GRAIN SORGHUM RATE

The price support loan and purchase agreement rate is \$1.83 per hundredweight for grain sorghums grading No. 2 or better. This rate is based on the national average price support loan rate of \$1.71 per hundredweight. Grain Sorghums for 1963, to be eligible for price support, must grade No. 4 and contain not in excess of 14 per cent moisture. Grain sorghums meeting these requirements but grading "Smitty" or "Mixed Grain Sorghums" will also be eligible for price support loan or purchase agreement.

LOAN RATE FOR OATS

The loan rate is 75 cents per bushel for oats grading No. 3. The support rate was determined on the basis of the national average support price of 65 cents per bushel. Oats for 1963, to be eligible for price support, must grade No. 2 or better of No. 4 on the factor of test weight only but meeting No. 3 or better. Oats meeting these requirements but grading "Garlicky" will be eligible for price support loan or purchase agreement.

Negro Migrant Held In Fatal Stabbing Incident

Rosa Lee Harvey, 50-year-old Negro migrant worker of Boynton Beach, Fla., is being held in the Perquimans County jail following the fatal stabbing of Albert Wise, 29-year-old Negro migrant worker from a rural section of Delaware.

Hearing was waived at the Tuesday session of Perquimans County Recorder's Court and the woman was ordered by Judge Charles E. Johnson to be held for Superior Court action.

The Harvey woman is charged with murder with malice aforethought in the death of Wise, who was stabbed by the Harvey woman in this county last Friday.

Wise's body was removed to the Lowe's Funeral Home here awaiting the location of the man's next of kin. On Wednesday of this week the body was still at the home.
