not known? Have you not heard? The Lord is the ever-lasting God, the Creator of the lends of the earth. He does not faint or grow weary, his under-standing is unsearchable." (Isalah 40:28).

Lesson Text: Genesis 1 and 2.

The purpose of our study to-day is to introduce the Book of Genesis as a book of beginnings, with its picture of God as Cre-setor and Sustainer of the uni-verse, and to help us to see that he is continuing to work with order and purpose.

The word "Genesis" means "beginning." It is a well-chosen title for the book, for here we have the beginning of a narrative account of Hebrew history. But it is not enough to stress beginnings. Genesis tells us that creation was not the product of some blind combina-tion of natural forces or the accidental merging of chemical ele-ments. No, in the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. He stands prior to our world of nature and human existence as the self-conscious, purposeful power responsible for both. This was Israel's expla-nation for the unique relation-ship with God which she had felt through the ages, and which is reported in these books of his-tory beginning with Genesis. This relationship gives meaning to the history of manking throughout the Bible. God free ly chose to create the universe and mankind, and our Scripture records his mighty acts from this beginning through the events of the early church. Genesis 1:1 gives us this perspective from which all other events of his-tory are to be understood. God is; he has created; he continues to be; and he sustains his creation. Men's destiny as God's creation—this is the great theme of Genesis. At the very outset we are brought face-to-face with God. We are his creatures—no lesser explanation can be ade

At this point we are perhaps asking: What does this do to divine inspiration? To break the book down into its various pasts does not, however, deny inspiration.
