

## Time To Spray Peanuts - Cotton

"If you have not put out your diazinon on your peanuts by now, you are pushing your luck a little bit long, as this should have been put out before the first of August," states E. M. Thompson, County Extension Chairman. The recommended rate this year is the same as it was last year, 20 pounds to the acre. We know that there are many cases where maybe diazinon will not be of any great benefit, but as many of the farmers tell us, it is pretty good insurance in case the Southern root worm builds up as it has in some years past.

Peanuts and cotton both should be sprayed to prevent insect damage to these crops. In the case of peanuts, we are recommending copper sulphur with DDT, dusted or sprayed every 2 weeks at the rate of 15 to 20

pounds per acre. We know from the results from the past that dusting during the early part of September has helped to keep the peanuts on the vine and most everybody knows what damage insects can do to peanuts. In the case of cotton, from the last of July, it should be sprayed at 5 day intervals until the squares stop forming. We are suggesting that toxaphene and DDT be used in August to help to control Boll Weevils and Boll Worms also. "Regardless of how good prospects are in cotton or peanuts, you will not be satisfied with your yield unless the insects are controlled and the only way to do this is through proper dusting or spraying, using the right material, with a systematic schedule for application," further states Mr. Thompson.

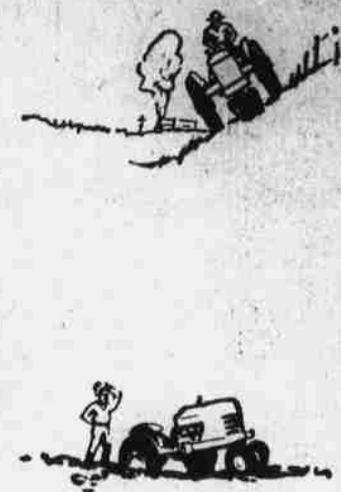
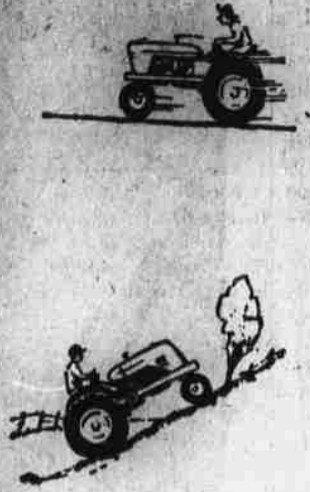

## Advice On Freezing Foods

"Catching the Freshness and Hold It" is a good slogan for freezing food. Freezing does not improve fresh food but it will keep the freshness and good quality for a period of 6 months to a year. To have fresh vegetables any time during the year, follow these steps:

1. Choose a variety that freezes well.
2. Freeze it when it is just right to eat fresh.
3. Work fast.
4. Scald (blanche) right.
5. Chill quickly and thoroughly.
6. Use good containers.
7. Get it into the freezer soon after packaging.
8. Freeze below 0 deg. F.
9. Store at 0 deg. F. or colder.
10. Put to cook while frozen and cook until just tender. These points should give you excellent frozen vegetables.

To blanch vegetables, put a pound (usually about a pint) of clean, nice fresh vegetables into a wire basket or blancher lowered into at least a gallon of vigorously boiling water. (Have the basket or blancher already in the kettle of water, so it will be hot and will not cool the water). Put the cover on and

start counting time. Keep the heat high under the kettle. When recommended time for that vegetable is up, lift the wire basket of vegetables out of boiling water. Plunge it into cold (icy is best), water. To know when to take the vegetables from cold water, break a piece open and touch the inside to the tip of your tongue. You can tell if it's chilled. Remove from cold water and package. For instructions and freezing charts contact Ila Grey White or Paige L. Underwood at your Home Economics Extension Office at the Perquimans County Agricultural Building. "Homemaking Information" is featured at the local laundromat. Ila Grey White, County Home Economics Agent, announces that bulletins will be placed at the laundromat for your use. Information on freezing, recipes, canning, sewing, household fabrics, mending and family relations will be displayed each week. You may read the bulletins and replace them on the rack or you may take them home with you. The bulletins may also be obtained from the Perquimans County Home Economics Agents office in the Agricultural Building.

## Notes On Soil Conservation

Robert Sutton, Claude Winslow and W. F. Elliott revised their conservation plans recently. J. P. Perry, Floyd Mathews and Eure Bros. prepared basic conservation plans for their farms.

Clarence C. Chappell is fertilizing and seeding fescue grass on the side slopes of his newly cut ditches. If you can get a vegetative growth on the side slopes of ditches soon after they are cut it will prevent so much dirt from silting into the ditch and the ditch will perform satisfactorily for a much longer time before having to be cleaned out. Love grass is doing a good job of maintaining the side slopes on a ditch in some sandy

land on the farm of Miss Lucy White at Belvidere. The side slopes were fertilized and seeded shortly after the ditch was constructed. It is a good practice to seed the turn row next to newly cut ditches in fescue grass to prevent erosion on edge of ditch.

Alvin Copeland constructed some field ditches on his farm at Hunters Fork. W. W. Bundy is constructing a ditch on his farm on the Harvey Point Road. Some of the Hairy Indigo seeded for summer cover crop is beginning to look good now.

W. F. Madre's coastal bermuda grass is furnishing a lot of grazing now.
