

Security Life Hits High Mark

At the semi-annual directors' meeting of Security Life and Trust Company in Winston-Salem today, President J. Edwin Collette reported that new business written during the first six months of 1963 exceeded that of any six-month period in the company's history. \$340,239,304 of new business was produced, representing a gain of 4.4% over the first six months of 1962.

Insurance in force now exceeds one billion, five hundred eighty seven million dollars. Capital and Surplus is \$16,100,946.41. Assets reached a new high of \$10,274,597.20. Income increased \$969,279.01 over the first six months of 1962.

Net gain from operations continued to increase substantially over the same period last year.

In closing his report of the excellent progress made during the first half of 1963, Mr. Collette said, "Our expansion program, involving all departments of the company, is continuing and the results from this will certainly be manifold during the next few years."

A regular meeting of the Mayor and Board of Town Commissioners of the Town of Hertford, N. C., held at the Municipal Building in the Town of Hertford, N. C., at 7:30 o'clock P. M., on July 8th, 1963.

Present were V. N. Darden, Mayor and Commissioners W. A. White, John G. Beers, W. F. Ainsley.
Absent: Henry C. Sullivan.

Whereas, the Mayor and commissioners were informed that the Housing and Home Finance Agency, were not satisfied with the ordinance previously passed by the Mayor and Commissioners of the Town of Hertford, which said ordinance was the approval and acceptance of the "North Carolina Uniform Residential Building Code", due to the fact that it did not apply to one and two family dwellings, as adopted, and whereas, it is the desire of the Mayor and Commissioners of the Town of Hertford, North Carolina, to correct this situation, and in order to properly regulate this matter; now, therefore,
