

## YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

Richard M. Ayres, representative of the Social Security Administration, is in Hertford the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month at Perquimans County Court House.

What protection do you have against loss of income because of a serious illness or injury? Are you aware of your rights to one form of protection—social security disability insurance benefits?

Since 1957, monthly benefits have been paid to seriously disabled individuals under the disability provisions of the social security law. At the present time hundreds of persons in Perquimans County are receiving disability insurance payments each month. In addition to benefits for the disabled individual himself, payments are made to his family under the same conditions as if he had reached retirement age when he became disabled.

To qualify for disability benefits, you must have worked under social security in at least 5 years of the 10-year period ending when you became disabled. Your disability must be so severe that it prevents you from engaging in any substantial gainful activity and it must be of a type that is expected to continue for a long and indefinite time.

If you become seriously disabled, get in touch with your local social security office promptly to determine if you are eligible for monthly disability benefits. You can find the address of the office nearest your home listed in the telephone directory under Social Security Administration.
