Civil Service Now Accepts Application

The Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners for the Internal Revenue Service, Atlanta, Ga., announces that it will begin accepting applications from accountants and senior college accounting students for Internal Revenue Agent Trainee positions at grades GS-5 and GS-7 paying annual salaries of \$4,565 and \$5,540 respectively.

The lists of eligibles established will be used for filling positions in the Atlanta region of the Internal Revenue Service (Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee). Most positions will be available around July 1964, and interested persons should file applications well in advance of that time for consideration.

Trainees will enter well planned training programs, and chances for promotion are excellent.

More details may be had from the Internal Revenue Service Board of Examiners, and Civil Service Information desks located at many post offices.

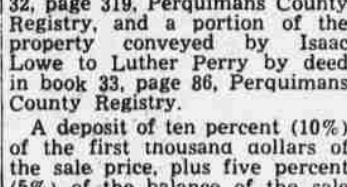
