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Educational bill
dominated Senate voting last week, and six important appropriations bills still awaiting original Senate consideration. Among these is the controversial Foreign Aid bill. Prospects are that there may be no action taken by the Senate as a whole on the tax bill. There is a growing feeling that action on the tax measure should be postponed until after the President's Budget message to Congress the first of the year. Hearings and committee markup of any tax measure appear to be weeks away from a final conclusion.

Educational Bill
Earlier this year the President requested an Omnibus Education Bill consisting of 24 programs. However, instead of resorting to an all or nothing approach, Congress has wisely chosen the objective method of approaching educational programs on a selective basis. Weeks ago the Senate approved a bill for Federal aid to medical, dental, and nursing schools. I have always thought that this was appropriate action in the field of health.

During the past week,
the Senate passed a bill which I favored to assist in the vocational education field: North Carolina's Graham Barden, when he was a member of Congress, was one of the pioneers in Federal assistance for vocational education. I think the measure before the Senate this session was a good bill, too. Like the Medical Education Bill it meets a national need under a selective program carried out with minimal Federal control.

The bill as offered to the Senate
A second educational bill before the Senate last week, the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963, carried provisions which caused me to offer amendments to it. The bill authorized assistance to non-profit institutions of higher education, private as well as public. I offered amend-

to strike provisions
which would aid church-owned or church-controlled institutions of higher learning. In my judgment such governmental aid is prohibited by the First Amendment of the Constitution of the United States. One of the great judges of the Supreme Court of the United States, the late Justice Robert M. Jackson, stated in his separate opinion in the Zorach Case which involved a similar question that "what should be rendered to God does not need to be decided and collected by Caesar."

Undertook to do precisely
what Justice Jackson said in that opinion ought not to be done. I believe that if we are to preserve religious liberty, or, indeed, any kind of liberty, we must keep the state's hands out of religion and religion's hands off the state. For these reasons, I sought to strike these provisions from the bill.

nine births and six deaths of which three were due to heart disease, one to intracranial vascular lesions, one to influenza and pneumonia and one to diabetes mellitus.

Reported in Gates County
were 19 live births and 11 deaths, of which four were due to heart disease, two to intracranial vascular lesions, three to other cardio-vascular-renal diseases and two to motor vehicle accidents.

In Tyrrell County there were
11 live births and five deaths, of which one was due to heart disease, one to accidents and three residual.

Reported in Washington
County were 29 live births and

nine deaths of which four were
due to heart disease, two intracranial vascular lesions, one to cancer, leukemia or Hodgkins disease, one to diabetes and enteritis and one residual.

ELIZABETH CITY had 34 live
births and 16 deaths, of which three were due to heart disease, three to intracranial vascular lesions, two to cancer, leukemia or Hodgkins disease, one to influenza and pneumonia, one to home and farm accidents, one to prematurity and two residual. There were two infant deaths.
