Referendum January 14 For Voters To Decide On "Little Federal Plan" Idea

Registered voters will have Founders Day opportunity Tuesday, Janu- At Central PTA ary 14, when the polls open to on the constitutional amendment, one known as the "Little Federal Plan."

The bill calls for the State Senate to be redistricted according to the 1960 census. The special session amendment proides for the State Senate to be increased from 50 to 70 Senators, providing for compulsory redistricting of Senate, and reducing the number of Representatives from 120 to 100.

The other amendment to be oted on at this time is the regular session amendment. The constitutional amendments empowering the General Assembly to make the rights of husband and wife the same in each other's separate property.

Governor Terry Sanford has announced that the State Highway Commission will receive contract bids on January 28 for the construction of a new bridge over the Perquimans River near

The bridge will be located on the new U.S. 17 Hertford bypass.

In making the announcement, Governor Sanford said: "This is another project in the centinuing program by the State Highway Commission to give the citizens of North Carolina better highways in all sections of the state. Our state traditionally has been known as 'The Good Roads State' and projects like this one will keep it so."

The new U. S. 17 bridge for he Hertford bypass will be a part of a high type two-lane righway for U.S. 17 in this area. Other important projects on U.S. 17 in Northeastern North Carolina now under construction are the four-laning of the Elizabeth City by-pass and the four-laning of the Williamston by-pass.

U. S. 17 will be one of several alternates for motorists coming south from the Chesapeake Bay bridge-tunnel area. The bridge-tunnel project is schedu'ed to be opened in the spring or summer.

The call for bids by the State Highway Commission is for a 0.549 mile bridge over the Perquimans River.
