Rev. Fredrick E. Still Will Leave Methodist Church To Accept Call At Seattle

The Rev. Fredrick E. Still, minister of the First Methodist Church, will leave to accept a call to the First Methodist Church in Seattle, Washington, on Monday, June 15. He has accepted a call from Bishop Everett Palmer, in Seattle, Washington, to organize and build a new Methodist Church.

In talking to the editor of the Perquimans Weekly, the Rev. Mr. Still had this to say, "My calling in the ministry is to build churches. This is my job and desire. It is not my ambition to have great and large congregations. Success to me is not bigness or high positions, rather it is enjoying your work and doing what you can do better than anyone else and doing it right. Using your talent to the glory of God."

Mr. Still came to Hertford to be minister of the Methodist Church in July of 1961. While here he is responsible for the beautiful new addition to the church, the "Educational Building." While at Red Springs, N. C., he completed a church sanctuary.

The Stills, Fredrick, his wife Marjorie and their 9-year-old daughter Sheila will be leaving Hertford next week. (Seattle, Washington, incidentally, is Mrs. Still's native home.)

In leaving and speaking for the entire family, the Rev. Mr. Still stated that he, his wife and daughter, had enjoyed being here and their associations during the stay.

Town Board of Hertford Adopts 1964-65 Budget Calling For Same Tax Rate

The Hertford Town Board, meeting here Monday night, adopted the 1964-65 budget of \$227,000 and the present tax rate of 95 cents per \$100 valuation. The budget had increased slightly but will not increase the tax rate.

David Cox, local surveyor, was employed to survey and lay out a circular drive through the property of the park site at the end of the Perquimans River bridge on the causeway. Mr. Cox will mark trees to be removed for the drive. Much of the underbrush has already been removed. When work is completed, the swamp filled in, the area will be used for a picnic area.

The Board voted to rezone Grubb Street area between Farmers Feed and Seed Company and Hertford Veneers to an industrial zone.

It was voted to allow the firemen to spend \$100 for a supper to be held at the conclusion of the annual firemen's school, which will be held June 25. Also that a supper for Perquimans High School's eastern State Class AA championship football team and baseball team, which was runner-up in the state finals.

Jimmy Hunter, Ace Pitcher For Indians, Accepts \$75,000 Bonus Offer From Kansas City Club

Jimmy Hunter, 18-year-old Perquimans High School ace pitcher, who has made himself quite a name in baseball, has been signed by the Kansas City Athletics for the sum of \$75,000.

Hunter pitched five shutout games in the past two seasons with the Perquimans team. In a 12-inning game this spring Hunter struck out 29 batters. His over-all record is 26-2.

Hunter, a right hand pitcher, is 6-1 and weighs 190 pounds. He will join the club during its current road tour and probably will be assigned to a farm club later.

Hunter is possessed of good speed, a fine curve—"just everything a pitcher could be expected to have." He is a natural athlete, having been an All-Conference linebacker for the Perquimans football team last fall.

Last November, while hunting with his brother, Jimmy was accidentally shot in the foot. He lost the little toe on his right foot in the mishap and still carries 25 No. 2 shot in his foot. Because of this, he was not able to begin pitching until the 1964 season had actually begun in early April.

Perquimans Indians Lose State AA Championship To Guilford County Team In Final Playoffs

Perquimans High School's Indians, who won the state crown a year ago, were defeated in this year's series to the Guilford Club and hung up the state championship.

The Indians went to Greensboro last Wednesday for the playoff game and took the first game from the Northeast Guilford's team 1-0.
