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County ASC Committee Will Again Be Elected By Mailing In Ballots

Farmers are being reminded that dates of nominees for membership on ASC community committees now are being established at the ASCS County Office. And a special effort is being made to secure the greatest possible participation of eligible voters in the election.

Preston Nixon, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said today that farmers who are eligible to vote in the committee elections also have the right to nominate as candidates for committee membership any farmer who is eligible and willing to serve. Such petitions, signed by six or more eligible voters, may be filed at the county office any time before August 19, 1964.

Additional nominations may be made by the incumbent ASC community and county committees, if these are required or determined desirable.

"We want the best men available to serve on our ASC committees," Chairman Nixon declared, "because the committee system is the backbone of farm programs — those dealing with conservation of soil and water, as well as the price support activities in various commodities. In the last couple of years the former-elected committee system, unique in the history of agriculture, has come under considerable scrutiny. As a result of intensive study by official groups, the system is not only being retained, but has been greatly strengthened."

Here in Perquimans County, Mr. Nixon points out, the impact of ASC committee-administered programs on the welfare of individual farmers and collectively on the life of the county, is considerable. For instance, the conservation of farmland was improved under the Agricultural Conservation Program, and the "conservation" of the land is being improved by the participation of farmers in the balance from ASC.

Corn Meal Muffin Bake-off Will Be Held August 14th

The annual 4-H Enriched Corn Meal Muffin Bake-off will be held at the Perquimans County Agricultural Building on Friday, August 14, at 10 A. M. All 4-H'ers enrolled in the Foods and Nutrition project are eligible to participate. There will be two divisions: Pre-teen; ages 9-11, and Early Teens, ages 12-14. First place winner will receive a cookbook and second place winner a pen and pencil set. Early Teens ages 12-14 first place winner will receive \$25.00 U. S. Savings Bond and second place winner an electric hand mixer.

The program is designed for the purpose of encouraging 4-H members to know the value of enriched corn meal in the diet as a good low cost food; to influence others to use enriched corn meal and make better corn muffins; to learn skills in food preparation; to develop an appreciation for good quality muffins; to improve personal and family health through the development of better food habits.

Mrs. Paige Underwood, Associate Home Economics Agent, states that the Enriched Corn Meal Program and prizes are well worth a 4-H'ers time and interest. She encourages all adult leaders and parents to provide transportation for the bake-off.

Map Director For State Now Available

A North Carolina map directory listing more than 80 different maps and the sources from which they can be obtained has been published by the Travel Information, Conservation and Development, Raleigh for free distribution.

The directory, Information Bulletin No. 149, contains information on highway and general state maps; county, regional and recreation area maps; fishing, hunting, and navigation maps; lake maps; and special purpose maps (geologic, soil, literary-historical, etc.). Prices of maps for which there is a charge are included.

The Travel Information Division does not publish or sell maps. The tourist edition of the Official North Carolina Highway Map, published by the State Highway Commission for free distribution, is used by the Travel Information Division in responding to travel inquiries.

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Freddie Combs Thrills Crowd In East-West Game

In a breath taking East-West All-Star game which wasn't decided until the last 20 seconds, Freddie Combs, a defensive halfback of Perquimans High School, sped 91 yards for a touchdown on the second half kickoff.

Though the West All-Stars captured a 12-9 victory over the East, Freddie Combs of Perquimans High was the boy who put the East momentarily ahead 7-6 through his heroics and also turned a game that dragged at times in the first half into a second half thriller. The West finally triumphed by a 12-9 margin.

The touchdown made by Freddie Combs was the longest TD play of any kind in East-West All-Star history. The unusual story about Combs was that he was knocked out in practice Saturday morning, suffered a cut over his eye and had to sit out an East drill session. He opened the cut again in the first half, but that didn't stop him from turning in the longest TD in East-West All-Star history. It took Combs only 14 seconds to run the 91 yards on the kickoff return for the TD.
