County Commissioners And School Board Are 100 Per Cent In Favor Of \$100 Million School Bond Issue

Perquimans County Commissioners and Board of Education in setting up the drive for the \$100 million dollar school bond election, selected the following committee to lead in Perquimans County: Mrs. R. S. Monds, chairman; Dr. A. B. Bonner, chairman of the School Board; Bob Spivey, chairman of the County Commissioners; Mrs. Walter Umphlett, president of the Perquimans Central PTA; Mrs. Dan Berry, president of the Hertford Grammar School PTA; and Mrs. John Newby Winslow, president of the Perquimans High School PTA.

The school bond election will be held on Tuesday, November 3, in connection with the national election. One hundred million dollars is needed in North Carolina to build, repair and equip school buildings.

Perquimans County's share, as allocated according to the number of children in average daily attendance in the schools, would be around \$264,000.

A joint resolution was passed by the Board of County Commissioners and the Board of Education endorsing the \$100 million school bond issue as follows:

Whereas, adequate public school buildings, as well as qualified teachers and up-to-date courses, are necessary ingredients of a sound public school system; and

Whereas, the construction of necessary public school buildings is imposing an ever-larger burden on county property taxes and county property taxpayers; and

Whereas, the General Assembly has offered to help counties meet this burden by authorizing the issuance of \$100 million in state school bonds, subject to the approval of the voters at the general election on November 3, and

Whereas, if these state school bonds are approved on November 3, the public schools of Perquimans County will receive the sum of \$214,329.39 for use in building additional school buildings when they are needed; and if these state school bonds are not approved, the taxpayers of Perquimans County will have to raise this amount from property taxes; and

Whereas, this amount and more will be necessary in the immediate future if the children of Perquimans County are to have adequate buildings in which to study and prepare for a productive role in the life of their community, the county and the state;

Now therefore be it resolved by the Board of County Commissioners of Perquimans County, that the state school bonds be and they hereby are heartily endorsed, because they will help provide the additional school buildings that our children need. And be it further resolved that all the voters of Perquimans County be and they hereby are urged to vote FOR the issuance of these state school bonds at the general election on November 3.

As Found In The Perquimans Weekly Files of Yesteryear

The insurance policy for the county school buildings was reviewed and approved for 1964-65 in the amount of \$1,523,000.

County Chosen To Participate In State Fair

Perquimans County is one of three counties selected by the Home Demonstration State Council to participate at North Carolina State Fair October 12 through 17.

Each year three counties are chosen to display special exhibits depicting work the clubs are doing or ideas they are promoting. Other counties participating are Wayne and Person. Each exhibit will be awarded a premium of \$250.

There are 667 Home Demonstration Clubs in the State Council with a total membership of 18,000.

Bake Sale Will Be Held October 10

The St. Catherine Auxiliary of Holy Trinity Episcopal Church will hold a bake sale on Saturday, October 10, beginning at 10 o'clock in the morning.

The bake sale will be held in the Parish House at Holy Trinity Church and is the first of a series to be held.

Perquimans County has been designated an emergency loan area as the result of crop yield reduction caused by extreme drought condition from May through mid-July of this year. Hugh A. Clark, county supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration, stated that in certain sections of the county all crops have reduced yields, but that the major reduction is in corn. It is estimated that corn yields are reduced from 10 to 80 per cent county-wide.

Emergency loans at 3 per cent interest may be made to eligible farmers for feed, seed, fertilizer, insecticides, farm supplies, equipment repair, replacement of machinery worn beyond economic repair and other essential farm operating expenses.

Farmers who need financial assistance and feel they are eligible for an emergency loan are urged to apply at the local Farmers Home Administration office located in the Davenport Building in Hertford. Office hours are Monday, Wednesday and Friday of each week from 8 A. M. until 5 P. M.

Johnson Gives Uniforms - Hats To Marching Unit

Members of the Perquimans County Marching Unit were presented red, white and blue uniforms and hats by President Lyndon Johnson in Raleigh on Tuesday night, where they performed for the President and the "Lady Bird Special" group in the Coliseum before a capacity crowd.
