

Education Board Plans To Acquire Cox Land For Parking At Cost \$12,002

The Perquimans County Board of Education met in special session Monday. A committee composed of Mary Holley, George Skinner and Ernest Dail, representing the parents of school children, appeared before the board in the interest of safety measures for school areas in the town of Hertford.

The committee was thanked by the board for its interest in the matter and John Danchise, a member of the board, was appointed to meet with the Town of Hertford Board of Commissioners next Monday to see what could be worked out.

The Perquimans Board of Education has heretofore determined that it is necessary to acquire additional land for the purpose of parking, physical education and necessary expansion of the Perquimans County High School and whereas various sites have been investigated and the land known as the "Cox Property" has been determined as the best site suited for the needs and requirements of the school and that this property should be acquired, made the following resolution that the board make the following proposal, "offer the Sallie Cox Urquhart estate the sum of \$12,002 or \$1,700 per acre for 7.06 acres of property as described in a plat prepared by David Cox, Jr., on April 10 of this year.

The board approved the basketball schedule as presented but recommended that no game be played on Tuesday of the week of mid-term examinations. The sale of one surplus truck to Ralph Jordan for \$181.50 was approved by the board.

Request for a leave of absence for Mrs. Ann A. Nowell until January, 1965, was approved.

The board approved and authorized the transportation of Debbie Cherris by school bus to and from school. The Cherris child is sister of Donald Lee Cherris, a 7-year-old second grade pupil at Winfall Central Grammar School who died from injuries suffered when struck by an automobile on Thursday morning, October 16, while on the way to Winfall Grammar School.

Veterans Day To Be Observed On November 11th

Veterans Day on November 11 is a day of marked significance for this nation and its citizens.

Congress has seen fit to legally set aside Veterans Day in honor of the men and women from all walks of life who have met the greatest obligation of their American citizenship. That is honorable service in the nation's armed forces in wartime.

Veterans Day, 1964, falls in a year also of particular historical significance. This year is the 50th anniversary of the beginning of World War I and the 25th anniversary of the start of World War II.

Veterans Day honors the veterans of all the nation's eight wars — from the Revolutionary War onward to the Korean War. In observing this day, we honor an estimated 445,000 men and women from North Carolina who wore the uniform of their country in wartime.

Of that great number of veterans, over half of them or 229,000 served in World War II—the nation's largest and most costly conflict.

Today there are approximately 433,000 veterans of all wars living in North Carolina. That number includes about 7,500 women veterans. It also includes about 13 recipients of the nation's highest honor—the Congressional Medal of Honor.

Service in four wars are represented by the 433,000 living veterans. The conflicts are Spanish-American War (1898); World War I (1917-18); World War II (1941-46) and the Korean War (1950-53).

Of the 22 million total of today's veteran population in the United States, approximately eight out of ten are married and the heads of families. In fact, the nation's veterans and their families comprise over 40 per cent of the U. S. population today.

Veterans will be an important part of our population for many years to come. But aging will make great changes in the veteran population's composition.

Cotton Allotment Is Set For 1965

North Carolina farmers have been allotted 459,958 acres on which to grow their 1965 upland cotton crop under the national cotton program. This represents the state's share of the 16-million-acre national allotment and of the 200,000-acre national acreage reserve (to take care of minimum farm allotments), as announced recently by the Department of Agriculture.

At the same time, marketing quotas were proclaimed for the 1965 cotton crop and December 15, 1964, was set as the date of a national referendum on the quotas. Preston Nixon, chairman of the Perquimans ASCS County Committee, explained that the state allotment will be apportioned among counties and the county allotments among farms according to provisions of the law. Notices of farm acreage allotments will be mailed to operators of cotton farm prior to the referendum.

Cotton growers voting in the December 15 referendum will determine whether marketing quotas will be operative for the 1965 crop of upland cotton. Approval by at least two-thirds of those voting is necessary in order to put the quotas into effect.

Nixon pointed out that the domestic allotment program, authorized by legislation enacted last spring, will be in effect for the 1965 upland cotton crop if marketing quotas are approved in the December 15 referendum. Under this program, a cotton farmer has the option of planting within his farm's effective allotment or the domestic allotment. (The effective allotment is the farm allotment after any release or reapportionment.) For this voluntarily reducing their acreage, growers may qualify for price-support payments in addition to the regular price-support loans. The domestic allotment program was in effect

Final plans for the largest mass immunization program ever staged in Northeastern North Carolina are now taking shape as the First District Medical Society prepares for a nine-county Siop Polio Campaign.

"By the end of the week we will have more than 500 volunteer citizens—physicians, nurses, Jaycees, school principals, PTA women, ham radio operators and law enforcement officers — recruited to man 37 public clinic locations in the nine county area to give the first of three doses of Sabin oral polio vaccine on Sunday, November 15," Dr. T. P. Brinn of Hertford, chairman of the project, reports.

Dr. Brinn said the campaign will run smoothly and that it will take only a minute to send a resident of one of the counties through a public clinic on Sunday, November 15, between noon and 5 P. M. to eat a sugar cube on which will be dropped two drops of the vaccine.

Rufus M. Riddick Is Crew Leader For Agriculture Census

Rufus M. Riddick of Hertford has been named a crew leader for the 1964 Census of Agriculture, Joseph R. Norwood, director of the regional office of the U. S. Bureau of the Census at Charlotte, has announced. The new crew leader is one of about 1,825 persons throughout the U. S. to receive this appointment.

The new crew leader will supervise a team of census enumerators who will visit all farms in Perquimans County to collect official census questionnaires from farm operators. Enumeration of all farms in the county will take place in November and early December.

The census will be taken in the following way: Shortly after November 5, the Bureau of the Census, an agency of the U. S. Department of Commerce, will mail census questionnaires to all rural boxholders. Those required to fill out the forms should do so and hold the questionnaires until a census enumerator comes to collect them. At that time, the enumerator will help answer any questions that may have proved troublesome.

The crew leader is a key person in conducting a Census of Agriculture. He recruits and trains the enumerators, schedules their work, reviews the accuracy of completed forms, and conducts difficult interviews.

The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in years ending in "4" and "9" to gather information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U. S. economy. Data gathered include the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock inventories, and information on farm equipment and improvements and income and some production expenditures.

The information will be published starting in 1965 for counties, states and the nation.

Exams Called To Fill Postal Jobs
