**Veterans' Corner**

**Veteran Preference In Federal Employment**

Veterans receive special preference in federal employment over non-vets. However, veteran preference is not a guarantee of getting a government job, nor is it a vested right to a government job for life. It is a uniform system for assisting veterans in obtaining and retaining a federal job for which they are qualified. The basic ideas behind veteran preference are (1) to recognize the economic loss suffered by the citizens who have served their country in uniform; (2) to restore veterans to a favorable competitive position for government employment, and (3) to recognize that a larger obligation is owed to disabled veterans. Below are authoritative answers by the Veterans Administration to some of the many current questions from former servicemen and their families.

Q. Where should I write regarding my father's U. S. government life insurance policy?

A. Write Veterans Administration Center, P. O. Box 8079,

Philadelphia, Pa. 19101. Be sure to give your father's full name, last address and, if possible, number of insurance policy.

Q. If a separate signed a statement upon discharge from service that he had incurred no injury or disease as the result of his military career, would that prevent him from filing any VA claim later?

A. No.  
 Q. When a veteran submits evidence in a disability claim, must it be in the form of an affidavit?

A. No. It is no longer necessary as VA now accepts a statement in which the writer declares that the information he has given is true.
