This bill, according to Mr. Lane, is designed to clarify the public welfare laws with respect to the operation of nursing homes are boarding homes by welfare offi-cials and their relatives. The payment of public welfare

or public assistance funds to a nursing home or bearding home owned or operated in whole or in part by certain individuals. The statute as it presently reads is not clear, and its coverage is so broad that in some counties it covers boarding homes needed for the care of indigent aged persons,

As the statute now stands, it applies to a member of the State Board of Public Welfare, a county welfare board and a board of county commissioners, and it applies to an employee of a state or county welfare department, or sister of any board member or This coverage is certainly appropriate.
