So many people do not know that the only way in which a serviceman may come home in an emergency is through the verification of the emergency by the local Red Cross Chapter. This request is made by the Red Cross field director on the serviceman's base. The Red Cross cannot and is not able to grant leaves - they can only verify conditions which might warrant the military granting the requested leave and help make arrangements for the leave.


