Farmers voting in the comreceived an envelope containing a ballot and two envelopes. The farmers should vote for five persons listed on the ballot and insert the ballot into the blank envelope. The blank envelope should then be inserted in the envelope addressed to the county ASCS office. He should sign the certification on the back of the envelope and drop in the mail Please remember that only one ballot can be placed in the return envelope since every voter must sign the certification. If a husband and wife are each eligible to vote each must return their ballot in separate envelopes.

When the ballots are received in the county ASCS office, the envelope will be checked to be sure the voter is eligible to vote. The blank envelope containing the ballot will then be removed from the larger envelope and stop at a duly erected stop placed with all the other ballots. Each ballot will, therefore, lose its identity before its tabulated. The county ASCS committee will publicly open and tabulate all ballots on September 15. At this time, none of the ballots will bear any identification of the person voting. It is necessary that each person voting sign the certification on the envelope in which the ballot is returned. If the certification is not signed the ballot inside will not be tabulated. Any person signing by mark must have his mark witnessed.
