items: On 24 December 1783, he wrote that he "set out in the rain to Hertford Town; I spoke in a tavern; the people seemed wild and wicked altogether."

Asbury came again to the county in 1799, staying with George Sutton near New Hope. On 13 March of that year he "had a meeting at a house near Nags Head Chapel, where I preached a short sermon from I Peter
