Combined sales of E and H Bonds for January-October amounted to \$50,9 million, representing the best January-October sales since 1946 and soaring ahead of sales for the comparable period in 1966 by 9.8 per cent, This amounts to 72.3 per cent of the state's 1967 quota of \$70,400,000.

In Perquimans County, Bond sales for the month were \$3,151. For the first ten months, totaled \$47,344, which is 69.3 percent of the County's quota for this year, according to R. M. Riddick, who is Perquimans County Volunteer Chairman for the Bonds Program.
