Law Will Reduce **Worthless Checks**

Losses resulting from checks in North Carolina will be 'sharply reduced" as the result of the new law requiring photos in color on all drivers' licenses issued in this State.

This is the opinion of officials of the N.C. Merchants Association, which gave all-out support to the photo plan in the 1967 session of the Legislature.

The 10 other states having similar laws report that the newtype driver's license is the "ideal identification" needed for cashing strangers' checks, according to Thompason Greenwood, executive vice president of

"Although it will require four years for every driver in the State to get his photo on his driver's license, this law so widely supported by the merchants should be a definite crime deterrent in North Carolina," said Greenwood,

He added that the 45 bad check and security clinics conducted by the Association last fall showed that the driver's license -- with or without photo - is the identification generally used by merchants and other business people in cashing checks in North Carolina.

Greenwood labeled social security cards, lodge membership cards, and other identification of this type as "almost worthless."
