Wools Need That Ounce Prevention

This is the season to put away wools not used during the summer and to clean or wash those left out for use. Clean wools are less likely to be damaged by moths and carpet beetles.

In moth infested homes it is wise to keep wools in tightly closed plastic bags or take them to a cleaner who uses a moth-proofing solution all year -- others do it only in spring and early summer.

If the cleaner gives no moth-proofing guarantee, it is wise to give garments the extra security of a mothproof chest, closet, or container.

Would you know a moth if you saw one? And how about that more destructive enemy, the carpet beetle? A recently revised USDA bulletin helps you recognize these enemies and keep them under control.

Recipe of the Week

The potato finds its way to the table at least once a day in the average home. Why not surprise your family with mashed potatoes that have that "something different" flavor?

MASHED POTATOES

4 medium-sized potatoes
1 small onion, minced
1/2 clove garlic
1 bay leaf
1/2 t. rosemary
1 t. butter or margarine
3 T. hot milk
1/8 t. mace
2 t. chopped parsley

Cook potatoes, onion, garlic, bay leaf, and rosemary, in enough water to cover potatoes until tender (20 to 40 minutes). Remove garlic and bay leaf. Drain, wash, add butter or margarine, hot milk and mace. Beat until creamy. Garnish with parsley.

*Four to six servings.

PETER PAN-APPLE SALAD DRESSING

(Makes 1 1/2 cups)

1/2 cup Peter Pan Peanut Butter
1/2 cup orange juice
1/2 cup pineapple juice
2 teaspoons maple syrup blended

Blend all ingredients together. Serve over apple, orange, pineapple and peach fruit salad.

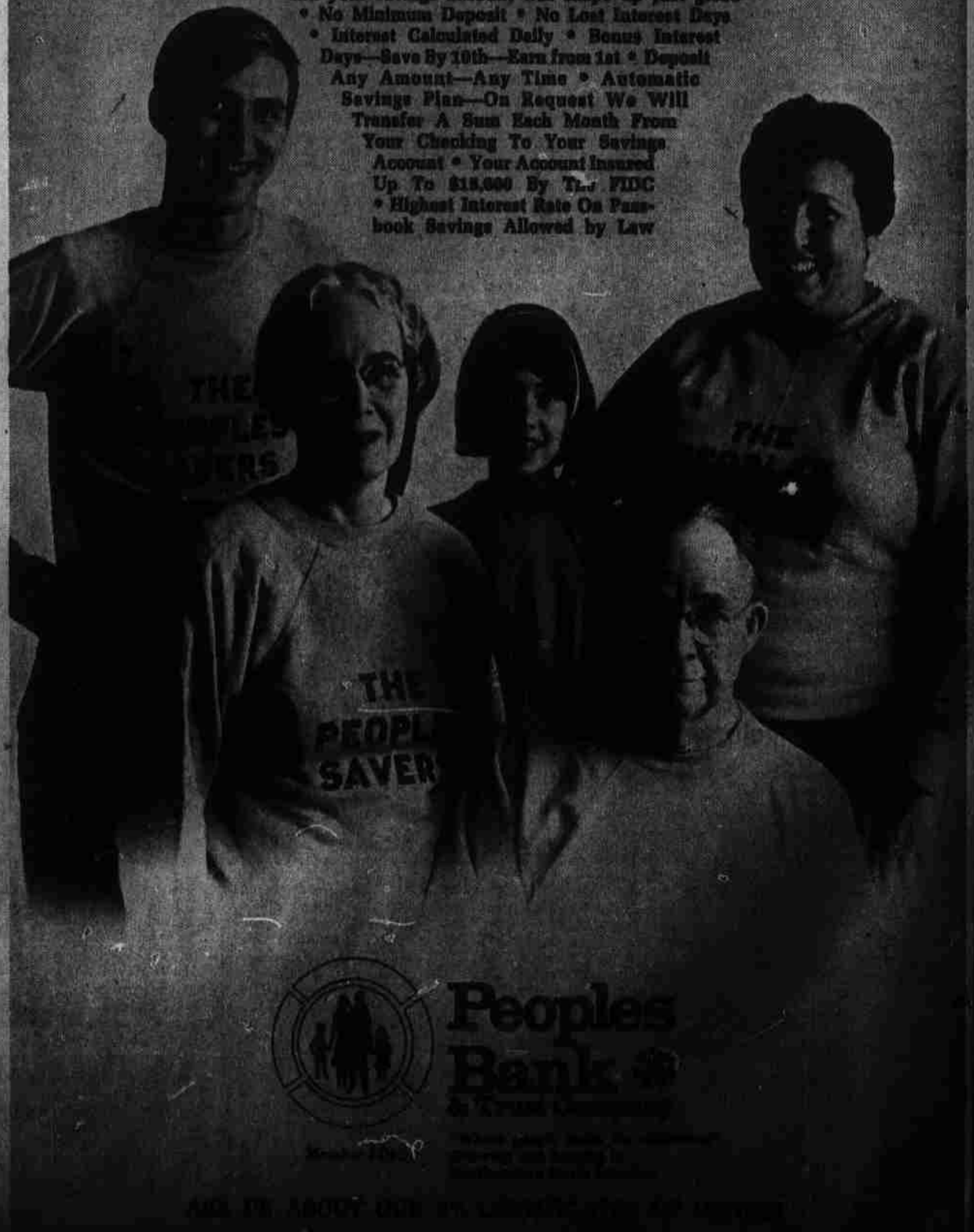
