No Half Measures

Air pollution and cigarette smoking have made the public more acutely conscious of a medical fact with which these phenomena are closely associated: respiratory diseases, of RD.

Among this group of ailments that affect the breathing system, the ones most directly caused by or related to cigarette smoking are emphysema, chronic bronchitis and asthma. These diseases (diseases of the lungs marked by obstruction of air passages). Doctors and public health agencies for some time have been urging people with symptoms of these diseases to quit smoking.

In a quarterly scientific journal, Clinical Notes, Dr. John A. Pierce, director of the division of pulmonary diseases at Washington University School of Medicine, writes: "Mere reduction in the number of cigarettes smoked has little effect on the illness." He adds: "For the patient with obstructive pulmonary disease, cigarette smoking is analogous to alcohol consumption for the patient with alcoholic cirrhosis of the liver."

In other words, for such people "No Smoking" is a must. Clinical Notes is published for physicians by the American Thoracic Society, medical arm of the National Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association. Your Christmas Seal association also has literature on the effects of cigarette smoking prepared for the general public and available on request. Ask for the free leaflet, "Cigarette Smoking, The Facts."

Recipe of the Week

The Christmas season is not very far away. It is not too early to prepare goodies for small treats for your friends (and the neighborhood children) when they drop in.

Glazed Nuts and Fruits
 1/2 c. white corn syrup
 1/2 c. sugar
 2 T. hot water

Boil all ingredients until syrup brittles in cold water. Keep hot in double boiler. Dip in nuts and fruits one at a time, taking out on the point of fork and laying on oiled paper.

Tutti Frutti Balls

Put through the food chopper 1/2 pound each of layer figs, seeded raisins, pitted dates and pecans or almonds; also 2 ounces of candied orange peel. Blend all together and put through the chopper again, using the finest blades until the mixture is as smooth as possible. Form into balls the size of a cherry, moistened with syrup from canned fruit if mixture is too stiff. Thicken with rolled and sifted macarons if too soft. Dip in melted chocolate.
