

Commissioners Proceedings

December 2, 1968

At a regular meeting of the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Perquimans, North Carolina, held on the First Monday in December, December 2, 1968, at 10:00 o'clock a.m., at its regular meeting place in the Courthouse in Hertford, Perquimans County, North Carolina.

Present: R. L. Spivey, chairman presiding with commissioners; Thomas D. Nixon, W. W. Bundy, Riley S. Monds, Jr., and Ellis Winslow. All commissioners were present.

Reports were received from the Agriculture Extension Service and Welfare Departments. On motion duly made and seconded, the Board approved the Comprehensive Water and Sewer Study for Perquimans County, North Carolina, as submitted by the Perquimans County Planning Board.

On motion duly made, seconded and passed, the Board appointed R. M. Thompson, for term, to serve on the Perquimans County Planning Board. On motion duly made, seconded and passed, the Board appointed Miss Thelma Elliott, and Mrs. Ervin Turner, members of the Perquimans County Library Board for a term of six years.

On motion duly made, seconded and passed, the Board authorized the budget to be amended in the amount of \$2,500.00, to come from surplus funds for the payment of a vehicle to be loaned to Perquimans County Rescue Squad.

On motion duly made and seconded, the Board passed the following resolution: That the Peoples Bank and Trust Company of Hertford, North Carolina, be and the same is hereby designated the official depository for funds belonging to or collected for Perquimans County, North Carolina.

Soil Moisture And Soil Sampling

"If it's too wet to plow, it's too wet to take soil samples." R.M. Thompson said this adage resulted from suggestions advanced by the Soil Testing Division of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture. The laboratory of the testing division is encountering problems in getting wet soil samples ready to test.

However, Mr. Thompson says, accuracy of sampling is the first consideration. A good sample from any field must be collected from at least 15-20 different places in the field. The soil from the different places then must be mixed thoroughly before about 3/4 is poured into the sample mailing box. Wet soil is almost impossible to mix. A good sample which is representative of the millions of plants of soil in the field can not be gotten from wet soil.

If a soil sample must be collected when the soil is wet, spread the 15-20 cores or "sub-samples" on a paper and allow them to dry without artificial heat. The barn or any other suitable place can be used to spread samples but make certain no fertilizers have ever been stored or absorbed on the surface on which the samples are spread. When the soil cores are dry, break them up and mix

the entire sample thoroughly before transferring a portion to the mailing box. Mr. Thompson suggested other advantages to mailing dry samples to the Soil Testing laboratory. Not the least of which is that the samples can be identified when they arrive at the laboratory. Less postage is required on dry samples and the drying facilities of the laboratory are always taxed to their limit at this time of the year.

Saute ham and onion in butter. Sprinkle with flour, add mushrooms and gradually stir in sour cream. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens. Pour over rice or noodles and garnish with parsley. Serves 3 or 4 and costs about \$1.30. Cost of electricity, less than 2c.
