A new chapple is now built." The Chapel was mamed Yeophen. Yeopim Chapel was probably served by visiting ministers such as Daniel Earl of Edenton, When the Church of England fell into disfavor during the American Revolution, Yeopim Chapel ap-parently continued to be used by local people. #### **Lumber Training** Program To Aid Industry

A new lumber training program will begin operation June 9, 1969 at Haywood Technical Institute, Clyde, North Carolina. The 4part training program will be the most complete of its kind to be associated with the Lumber Industry in the United States.

The complex now under con-truction has an expected value of 1/2 million dollars, Dona-tions valued at more than \$250,-000 have been received from Appalachian Lumbermans Club; Southern Lumber Manufacturers Association; U. S. Plywood, Champion Papers; T.V.A.; Magnavox Corporation of Tenness Salem Equipment Company, and Corley Manufacturing Company. The remaining money has been released through the Federal Manpower Development Training Act and North Carolina state

The facilities for training Sawyers, Sawfilers, Lumber Inspec-tors, and Dry Kiln Operators will include automatic circle and band mills, an automatic dry kiln, saw filing equipment, and other equipment needed for all phases of the program.

Students do not have to be high school graduates in order to qualify. If a student does not live within driving distance of Haywood Tech, he might qualify for an allowance to pay for living expenses in Haywood County while going to school.

#### **Peanut Growers Ask For Price Support Increase**

Peanut grower representatives from throughout the United States appealed to the Secretary of Agriculture through Under-Secre-tary Phil Campbell for a price support on peanuts for 1969 at a level of 80% of parity. Attending the meeting from North Carolina were: Joe S. Sugg, Executive Secretary of the North Carolina Peanut Growers Association: Commissioner of Agriculture James A. Graham; Marshall Grant, President of the North Carolina Peanux Growers Association; G. E. Fisher, President, Peanut Growers Cooperative Marketing Association; and Charles Smith, President of the Halifax County N.F.O. The meeting, held in the office

of Under-Secretary Campbell on April 3rd, was attended by 26 grower representatives from every peanut producing state, and produced urgent appeals by the representatives establishing the fact that a level of 80% of parity is required in order that growers might survive the economic pressures brought about by the cost-price squeeze existing in peanut production today. In 1968 the Secretary of Agriculture set the price support level at 77-1/2% of parity and the growers asking for an additional 2-1/2% increase do not feel that this is out of line with increases in income for other segments of the economy.

Under-Secretary Campbell expressed his sympathies for the peanut growers, stating that having just left the position of Commissioner of Agriculture in Georgia that he was thoroughly familiar with the plight of peanut farmers and would convey the message presented by the growers at this meeting to the Secretary. He pointed out that with the drain on the treasury by the Vietnam War, budget pressures were quite severe on domestic

It was pointed out by grower representatives that the price support increase of 2-1/2% in 1968 resulted in a seventeen million dollar increased income to the growers of peanuts in the United States and a reduction in the cost of the peanut program to the government by approximately seven million dollars,

has not heard about his refund should wait ten weeks before writing IRS, By waiting this length of time, most taxpayers will find their inquiry unnecessary, Mr. If it becomes pecessary to

write, the taxpayer should indicate where and when he filed his return and give his name, address and social security number, Wall

Millions of tax returns are handled every filing season at the Southeast Service Center which serves North Carolina taxpayers, The volume of processing opera-tions there makes it practically impossible for IRS to locate a particular return and to answer any question about # until processing is complete,

### Red Cross Fund Drive Now In Full Swing

With the Red Cross Fund Campaign in full swing, again this week, one of the most important jobs, Service To Military Families, will be highlighted.

This program is one of the most active phases of the Red Cross, particularly on a local level. Set up primarily to act as a go-between between the serviceman, his family and the military, it also aids veterans and their families, It aids servicemen and their families through counseling in personal and family problems, reporting and communication, assisting in application for governmental benefits, referral services, financial assistance, obtaining reports requested by Veterans' Administration and helping to meet the needs of disabled veterans and

their families. The war in Vietnam has caused a heavier traffic of messages and more cases requiring aid of some type during the past year. Locally, the chairman of this committee, Mrs. Marion Swindell. has handled 88 messages, written 16 letters, made one home visit and aided two families in appeals for help following fires. This doesn't include the many other messages she received from Field Directors, servicemen or their families for information and

On loans made to servicemen of \$195.31. \$149.75 has been repaid. One of the biggest jobs of Mrs. Swindell is to give quick verification of information concerning such emergencies as deaths and illnesses in servicemen's families, Before a serviceman can get leave for such emergencies, some authority must contact the

doctor or hospital for this verification. This is to prevent a man's taking a few days by telling an untruth. The Red Cross can also contact a hospital or doctor, acting in the same capacity as a member of the family for a serviceman for details about a rela-

tive's health. In case of a death or other emergency, the Red Cross will pass its verified information to the serviceman's base field director, one of whom is at each base and who is employed by the Red Cross, The organization helps the serviceman in such ways as making transportation plans for him and often lends him money. All contacts and information are kept in strictest confidence. The Red Cross does not give leave to servicemen - they only verify conditions and leave is determined by the military.
