Stock Plunge?

Chairman of the Federal Reserve Board William Martin recently told an international gathering of bankers that financial markets all over the world face a "collapse" unless there is a return to sound money principles.

Though the Federal Reserve Board chairman has made other warnings in recent years, this is probably the most pessimistic note he has sounded on the economic future of the nation. Mr. Martin said the nation is now experiencing a "speculative binge" and he believes it will not be "cured" without pain and suffering.

Many economists say another stock-market crash, at least on the scale of the 1929 disaster, is impossible under present conditions. Most forecasters believe there are too many floors under the economy for a crash to occur.

Only time will reveal the answer but the warning of the outgoing chairman of the FRB is worth consideration-even if one doesn't agree. Perhaps the major comfort in noting Martin's words is the fact he blames inflation for producing present conditions; the Nixon Administration is moving against a continuation of the inflationary spiral, and several of its spokesmen are predicting a downturn in inflationary pressure in the second half of 1969.

Keeping Cool

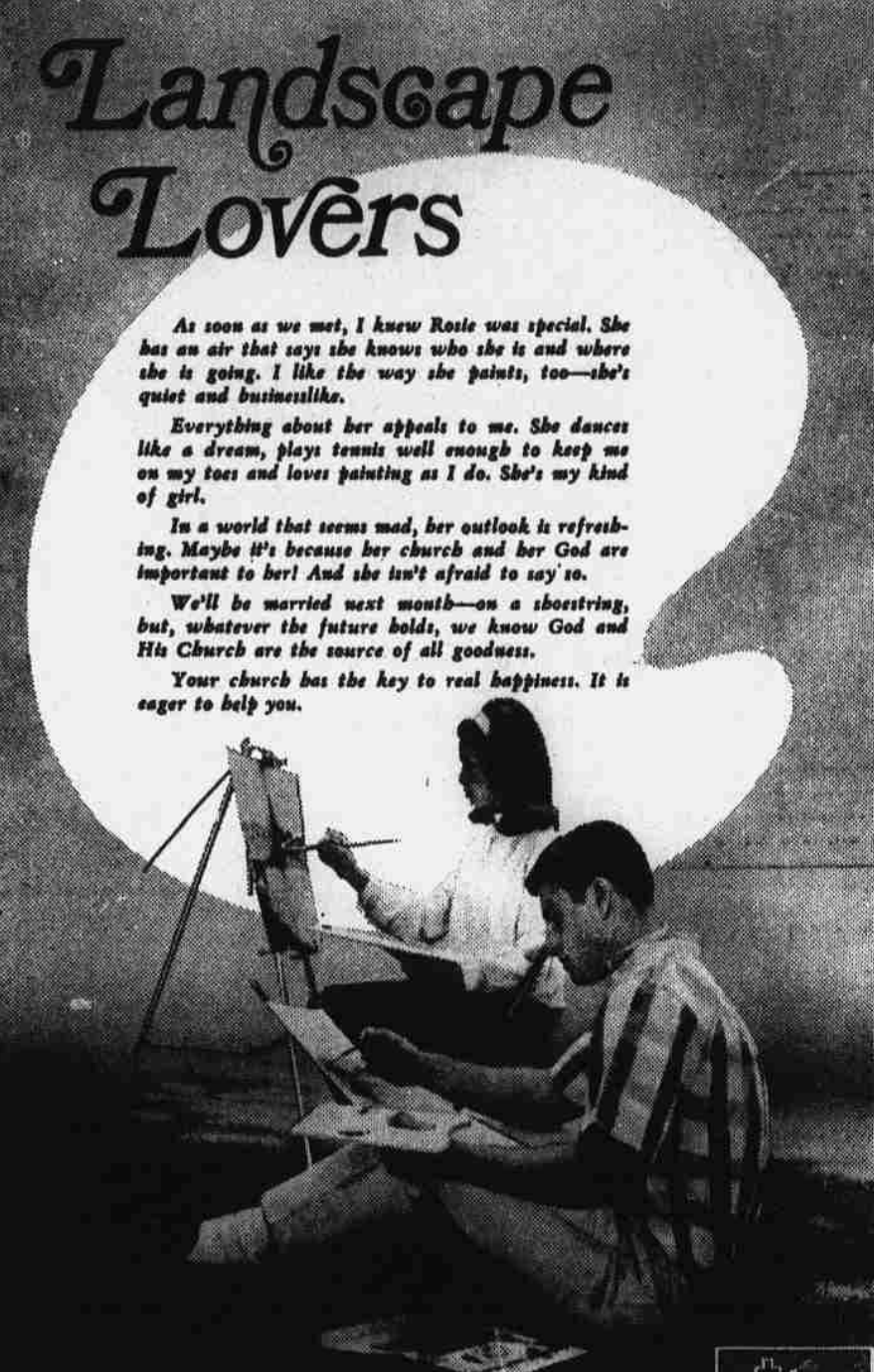

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GOD CHOOSES A PEOPLE

International Sunday School Lesson for July 13, 1969.
MEMORY SELECTION: "I will make of thee a great nation, and I will bless thee, and make thy name great; and thou shalt be a blessing."
-- (Genesis 12:2)

LESSON TEXT: Genesis 12:1-9; 17:1-21; 18:13-14; 21:1-5; 22:15-19.

In our lesson today, we will attempt to demonstrate the importance of God's directions in the lives of men, and -- specifically, as an example -- the life of Abraham, and the sureness and validity of His promises.

In preparation for the coming of the Redeemer of mankind, God chooses a people. The Israelites were the chosen race; and, although they did not realize it at the time, they were to be purely representative of God's concern for mankind.

Abram (later to be known as Abraham) was the chosen leader of his people, and through him, God was to make known His promises and His expectations of them as a race. God had assured Abraham that he would be the founder of a great nation, and would receive Divine blessing on all that he undertook, in return for implicit obedience.

As Biblical history unfolds itself, we are to see that all God's promises were to be fulfilled, although not without severe testing on Abraham's part.

The demands on Abraham were rigid . . . they consisted of a complete break with many things he held dear; he was to separate himself from those he held most dear (other than those who were to embark on his journey with him); he was to venture forth, entirely upon faith, and journey to a land which God would eventually reveal to him; and -- the supreme testing -- he would be asked by God to destroy his beloved child, Isaac, (a child of his old age) . . . the supreme test, as any parent will verify. That Abraham, although loath to do so, was willing to comply, is the greatest measure of the man. That he was prevented from making the supreme sacrifice is indicative of God's everlasting mercy . . . although He, Himself, through Christ, made that sacrifice Himself!

Such is the awesome majesty of God, and the infinite majesty of which human nature is capable!

In a time when the world was going through a period of forgetting God, and evil was rampant, God called upon a man of faith to establish a nation. His promises to Abraham went beyond his (Abraham's) time, and his children's time, for salvation and judgment are not bounded by time or circumstance . . . they hold as true today, as they did in the times of Israel's ordeals. The promises encompass all mankind, throughout the ages known to man!

And, as all promises, they must be held inviolate, for once they are violated, then both parties suffer. But . . . such is the nature of God, He has never reneged on His given Word . . . not once, although man has often forgotten his duties and obligations! If man were in the place of the Almighty, he would have thrown up his hands and walked away in disgust many times!

God's holy covenant with mankind, however, made through the precious person of Christ -- the forgiveness of sins and the opportunity for life everlasting -- will never be set aside, for God is ever faithful . . . not just to one people, but to all peoples.

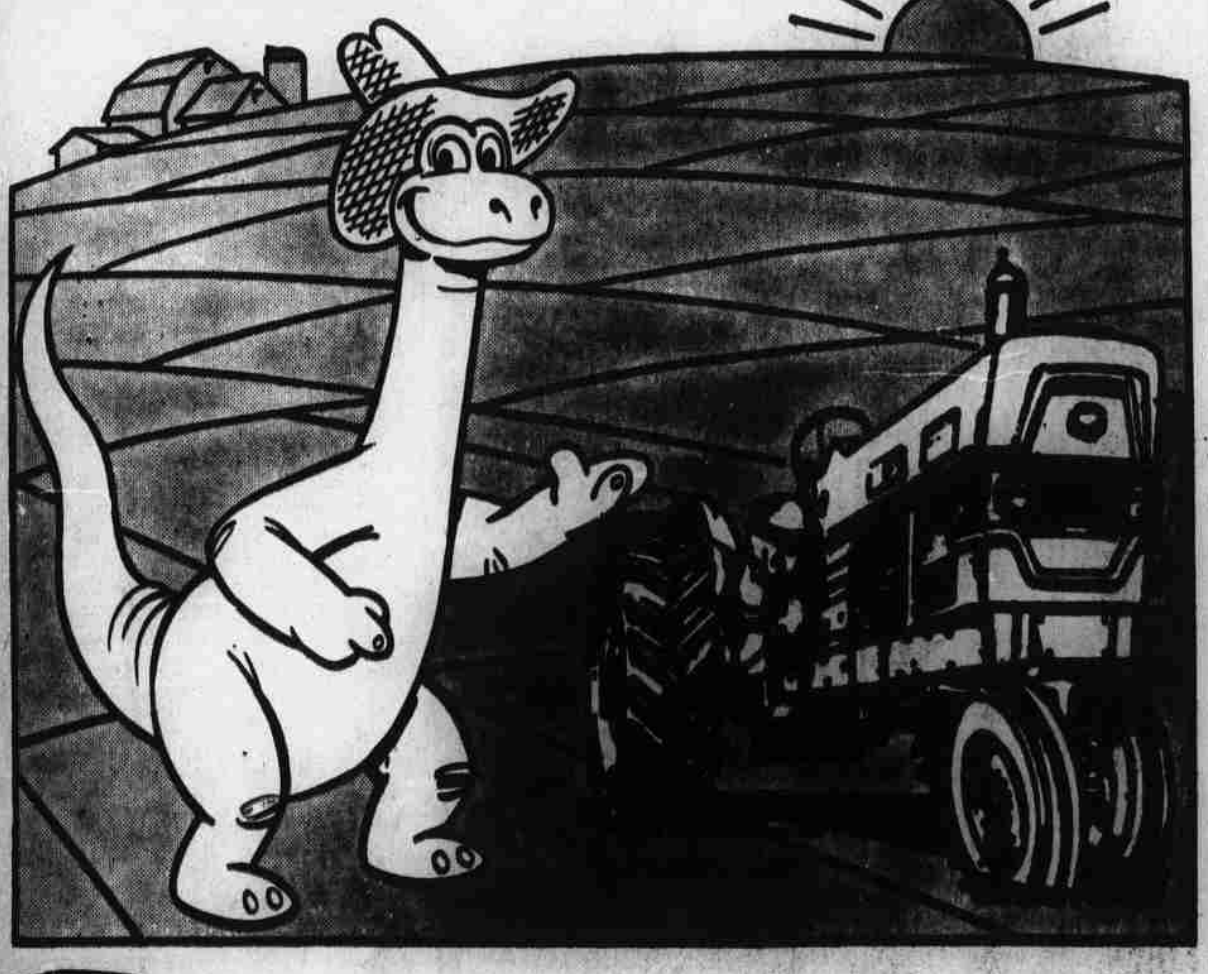
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
