guidance.

The following programs will be presented:

**Adult Basic Education--**Educational programs consisting of grades 1-8 for adults who have not completed their education. This program is free.

**High School Equivalency--**Educational programs consisting of grades 9-12 for adults 18 years of age or older, who are not enrolled in the public school system. This is a program whereby adults may complete their high school education and receive a high school equivalency certificate. The fee will be \$6.00 to cover the cost of the books used in these classes.

**General Adult Interest or Non-Credit Courses --** These are offerings that may be either academic, vocational, or culture oriented. The fee will be \$2.00 per course in most instances. These courses will vary as interest demands.

**Learning Labs --** The programs in the Learning Labs in Elizabeth City, in Edenton and in Manteo are designed whereby an individual can enter the laboratory and use programmed instructional materials at one's own convenience to study and progress at one's own rate of speed. The materials available range from non-reader to college-level work. Also available are instructional materials in various vocational areas.

Beginning September 2, Learning Labs in Elizabeth City and Edenton will be open Monday through Thursday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. and Friday from 8:00 to 4:30 p.m. The Lab in Manteo will be open from 8:00-9:30 p.m. each Monday and Thursday and hopefully other times as determined by interest shown in attendance. There are full-time coordinators to work with and assist adults that may enter. Anyone 16 years of age and older may now participate in the Lab programs. There are no organized classes at the Learning Labs. Each person sets up his own schedule and comes when it is convenient for him. There is no charge for attending. **Washington Report**

Last week Congress continued its summer recess. During the interval I had the pleasure of delivering a commencement address to the Beaufort County Technical Institute.

In preparation for the speech, I was astounded at the phenomenal growth of the community colleges and technical institutes in the state of North Carolina. From the creation of the first technical institute in the late '50s I find that we have now 80 schools of this type. The ever increasing enrollment is most impressive for the school year 1968-69, an enrollment of about 28,000. The last definite we have for the year 1967-68 was 189,000 students with a projected enrollment for 1968-69 of 228,000.

I chose for the subject of my address "Campus Unrest," for I think many of our North Carolina citizens are concerned about the events of recent months which disrupted the orderly processes of some of our institutions of higher learning.

The speech attempted to convey the fact that campus unrest is not solely the product of the present young generation but has existed in the past. It has been written: "Our youth now love luxury. They have bad manners, contempt for authority, disrespect for older people, Children nowadays are tyrants. They contradict their parents, gobble their food and tyrannize their teachers." Certainly, this has a ring of modern times, yet this quote

ity and violence, lost the confidence not only of the public, but of itself, to such an extent that when the opportunity to overthrow the caesars under the Kerenski leadership came in 1917, the student movement had become impotent and was useless, and never even played a part in this important stage of Russian history.

There is a clear cleavage between the students who have an objective in life and attend the university to prepare themselves to be able to accomplish that objective, and those students who would use the universities as a base for political revolution and destructiveness.

Certainly, no one would deny the students the right to express themselves as it relates to improvements of the institution or constructive changes. But, if the institution is to survive, the protests must be conducted in an orderly manner without endangering the total objective of the entire program of higher education, and they must also be void of outside influences.
