### College Of The Albemarle Enrollment High

"Enrollment at College of the Albemarle is at an all time high," Dr. Bruce Petteway, president, announced today with pride.

COA opened its door this fall to 737 full time students. This represents a five per cent increase over last fall's enrollment figure of 700. The largest number of students, 368, are in the Liberal Arts Program.

In addition to increased enrollment, students are taking heavier loads of course work than in the past, Dr. Petteway pointed out. This reflects the increasing desire of young people to get all they can from their educations, he added.

Projecting into the future, Dr. Petteway said, "We expect full-time equivalent enrollment figures to exceed 1,000 students in the near future."

However, comparing this year's enrollment figures to the 1968-69 figures, Dr. Petteway noted that the largest percentage increase, 100 per cent, is reflected in the occupational programs most of which are operating at full capacity. For instance, Dr. Petteway pointed out that students in the Electronic Technology Program have increased from 18 last year to 26 this year.

"We are delighted at the increased interest shown by students in vocational and technical programs at COA," Dr. Petteway said. "Exciting and rewarding careers are ahead for these young people because graduates of our occupational programs are in great demand."

### Maps And Mapping Services Available From Hiway Comm.

This week, during National Highway Week, the Commission will have its popular four-color official Highway Map back in stock and free on request to those who request it.

Since 1962 the mapping done by the State Highway Commission has been based on aerial photographs. Therefore, Commission mapping has been a more scientific and accurate process. Before that, all maps were drawn to scale by hand.

In 1916 the State Highway Commission issued its first official state highway map. This was done to assist the motoring public. Since then the demand for maps has grown along with the size of the motoring public. Nowadays the Commission distributes some 450,000 maps each year in answer to requests from the public.

Another service to motorists is a monthly bulletin on highway conditions. This lists all detours and all construction on state highways and Interstate highways. Schedules for all ferries in service in the state are also available on request.

The State Highway Commission also has available detailed maps of each county. These maps show cities and towns, all public roads by type from Secondary to Interstate, railroads, streams and parks, as well as many other features.

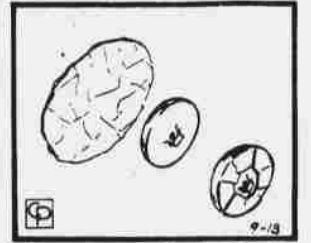

## Veteran's Administration

Veterans in college under the GI Bill today were offered a bit of advice by the Veterans Administration to be sure their GI checks arrive on time, at the right place and in the right amount.

Turn in your Certificate of Eligibility to the college registrar as soon as you register. See the school official returns it promptly to VA.

If your checks do not start within a few weeks after the VA gets your enrollment certificate, contact your nearest VA office.

If you change your college or course of study, apply immediately

to VA for a new Certificate of Eligibility.

If you change the address to which your checks are coming, notify both the VA and the Post Office.

Inform VA immediately of any dependency changes due to marriage, divorce, births or deaths.

Return promptly the Certificate of Attendance card you will receive from VA near the end of your enrollment period.

If you drop out of school — or even reduce your course load — tell the VA immediately.

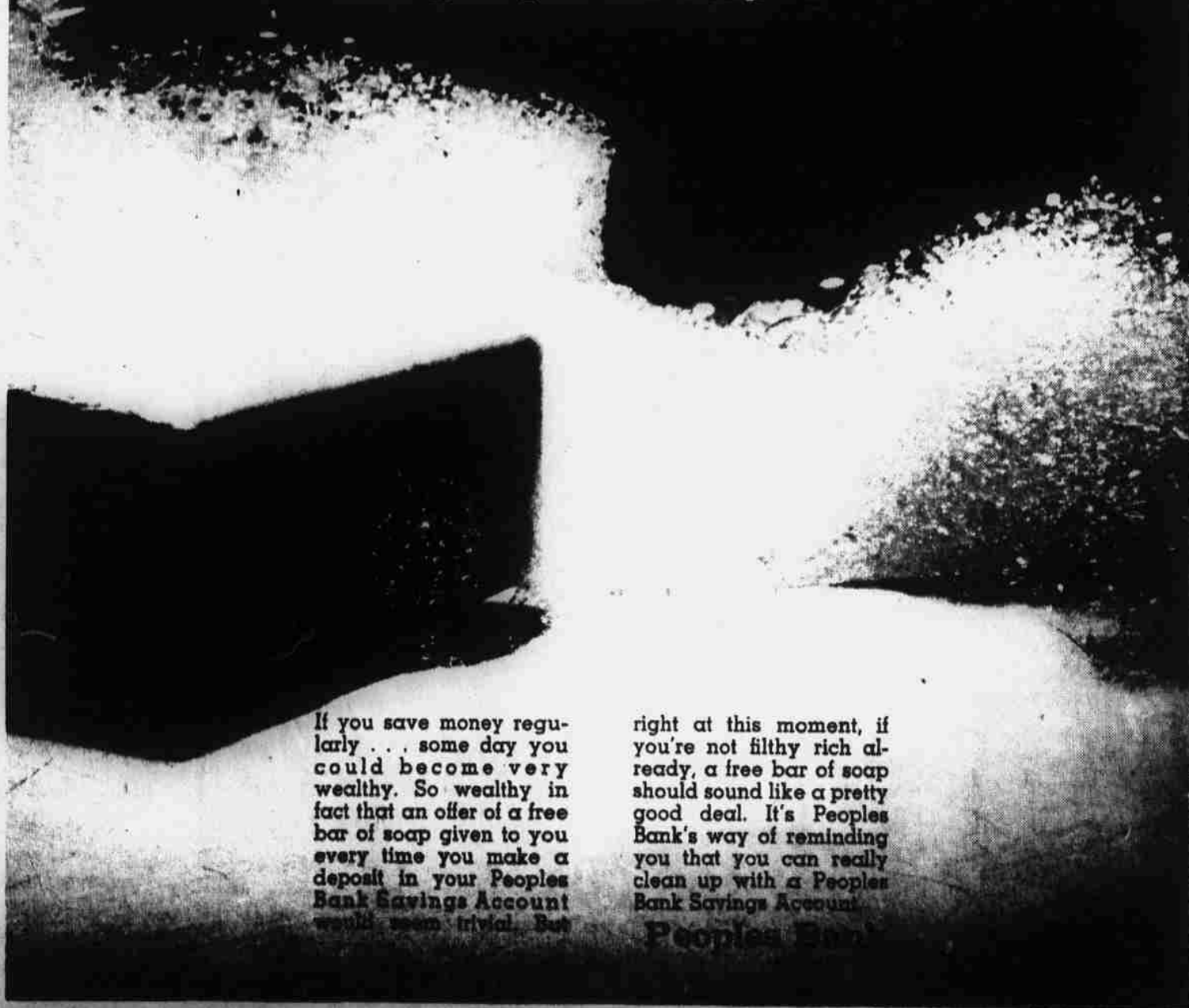
