W. R. Phillips, Manager of the Winston-Salem VA Regional Office, said that VA benefits are paid to war veterans with limited, income who are totally disabled for reasons not related to military service and to their widows, and to certain other dependents of veterans who meet income limitations.

Where benefits are based on income, the VA, by law, cannot make payments unless it receives the questionnaire containing the estimated income for next year.
