Social Services Homemakers and their supervisors from 60 North Carolina counties and other interested persons will attend the seventh Annual Homemaker Workshop at the Sir Walter Hotel in Raleigh November 19-21-21. At present, there are 173 homemakers employed by the county social services departments in these 60 counties.

The theme of this year's workshop is "Extending the Delivery of Services... Through the Use of Homemakers."

Mrs. Robert W. Scott, wife of the Governor, will address the opening luncheon session. State Social Services Commissioner, Clifton M. Craig, will preside over the opening session.

Mrs. Florence M. Moore, Asst. Director of the National Council for Homemaker Services, Inc. of New York City will speak the final day.

John Jordan, Jr., Chairman of the State Board of Social Services will present the closing address.

Its implementation depends on the extent of the need and the desire on the part of county officials to participate by providing necessary county matching funds. The largest share of this expense is provided by Federal and State funds.

In July 1947, North Carolina initiated its venture in homemaker service with a demonstration project in only three counties.
