to the sturdiness and soundness of eighteenth-century construction methods, Our ancestors, however, had their problems in finding competent carpenters. In October 1758 Zachariah Webb told the Perquimans County Court that he had agreed to pay Masey Wooldrige "the sum of Twelve shillings and six pence procklamation money for altering a Frame of a House of the said Zachariah's and Likewise Twenty six Shillings for covering the Roof of the said House and Pay him a Reasonable Charge for Weatherboarding the said House when the same should be Set up and framed by the said Wooddrige. That the said Wooldrige assumed and faithfully Promised that he would alter the frame of the said house and cover the Roof of the same and weather Board it in a Workmanlike and Substantial Manner and the said Webb giveing faith and Credit to the Promise and assumption of the said Wooldrige Paid to him the afsd.
