The Fair Labor Standards Act interstate commerce (FLSA) as amended in 1968 A non-technical provides different minimum wage standards for employmen effective February 1, 1970, ac cording to the U.S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour Division.

Guide to the Fair Labor Stan-dards Act' gives basic in-formation about the law's ployers are reminded that yes in employment brought the law by the 1966 iments will be entitled to not less than \$1.45 an hour effective February 1. The rate for these workers is currently at least \$1.30 an hour.

The Labor Department points out that employes in job-types covered under the Act prior to the 1966 amendments must continue to receive at least a minimum of

Overtime pay of one and onehalf times the employe's regular rate of pay for hours in excess of 40 in a workweek will remain in effect, unless specifically exempt.

Covered farm workers under the Act will continue to receive at least \$1.30 an hour. There is no overtime provision for hired farm workers.

An employer with employes stiblect to the minimum wage provisions of the Act may not discriminate in any establishment on the basis of sex by paying employes of one sex wages at rates lower than he pays employes of the opposite sex doing equal work on jobs requiring equal skill, effort and respon-sibility which are performed under similar working conditions. This applies to all employes within the establishment who are subject to the minimum wage provisions of the FLSA.

The Labor Department also reminds employers of the Age Discrimination in Employment Act which protects individuals 40 to 65 years old from age discrimination by employers of 25 or more in an industry affecting
