## Local Teachers At Raleigh Conference

Social studies teachers from rarious parts of the State met in Raleigh April 29 for a special conference sponsored by the State Department of Public Instruction.

The teachers have been involved in the field testing of new social studies materials for the K-3 student. The materials, which emphasize the conceptual approach to social studies learning, were written by North Carolina teachers under the direction of the social studies consultants of the State Department of Public Instruction.

The materials emphasize a learning approach in which build on their students knowledge of concepts (families, for example) from the earliest

level through high school. Content, teaching strategies, and pupil activities are organized around main ideas. Several schools in the State were chosen to field test the materials this vear.


