

### Civil Service Examination For Hearing Examiners

The U. S. Civil Service Commission today announced a revision in the nationwide examination for Hearing Examiners. The revision was made to broaden the base of recruitment and is expected to benefit those members of the Bar who have had limited opportunity to satisfy the administrative law requirement fully.

Federal regulatory agencies expect to appoint more than 150 Hearing Examiners from this examination during the next year at GS-15 (\$22,885) and GS-16 (\$26,547). Most of the appointments are expected to be at GS-15.

Hearing Examiners preside at formal hearings required by law and make or recommend decisions on cases involving the rights and liabilities of individual citizens as well as those affecting the economic welfare of large regions in the United States. They are employed by 25 different Federal regulatory agencies.

Applicants filing in the examination will be rated on the basis of their experience and an investigation of their professional qualifications. They must demonstrate their ability to write a decision and must participate in an oral interview.

### Canning, Freezing Workshop Slated For July 23

A quality canning and freezing workshop is scheduled for Thursday, July 23, at the Perquimans County Office Building.

Mrs. Taylor states that she has a supply of canning, freezing, preserving, jelly making and pickling bulletins. You may have one by calling 426-7897 or drop in at your County Extension Agent.

Applicants must have been members of the Bar for at least 7 years and must have acquired at least 2 years of experience either in the field of administrative law or in the preparation and presentation of cases at trial in courts of record. Experience in routine misdemeanor cases, probate, domestic relations, minor tort matters, and cases of a similar nature will not be accepted as meeting the quality of experience required.

Prior to revision of the Hearing Examiner Announcement (No. 318), 2 years of administrative law experience was mandatory. The broadening of this requirement to permit credit for 2 years of actual trial practice was authorized by the Commission at the recommendation of the Administrative Conference of the United States and after consultation with the

members of the Commission's Advisory Committee on Hearing Examiners.

Copies of Announcement No. 318, and all forms needed for filing, may be obtained from any one of the Commission's 45 Interagency Boards of Civil Service Examiners, any major Post Office, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. 20415.

Applicants previously rated eligible under the former announcement may retain their scores or recomplete in the revised examination. Applicants who were previously rated ineligible may recomplete without regard to any previously announced waiting period.

All applicants will be considered without regard to race, religion, color, national origin, sex, political affiliation, or any other non-merit factor.

### Pattern Drafting & Alterations Course Offered At COA

Have you often wished that you could draft your own dress patterns, or maybe even alter a commercial pattern?

Here's your opportunity to learn how. A Pattern Drafting and Alteration Course will be conducted by the Adult Division of College of The Albemarle, beginning Monday August 3, meeting daily from 9 a.m. to 12 Noon, until August 13. Classes will be held in Room 233 at the College.

The course is planned for the person with intermediate or advanced sewing skills, and is designed to acquaint the student with the methods of measuring and alteration necessary to achieve a custom fit. Students will draft a pattern from their measurements, make a muslin in basic design, and learn how to apply adjustments to commercial patterns.

becomes a "Mrs." must have her name changed on her social security card and have the change of name recorded with the Social Security Administration.

#### WHEAT REFERENDUM DATES FOR 1971 CROP

Secretary of Agriculture, Clifford M. Hardin, has proclaimed July 27-31 as the dates for a mail referendum on 1971 crop wheat marketing quotas. All persons who have a legal interest in a wheat allotment will be eligible to vote in the referendum. Eligible voters failing to receive a ballot may obtain one from this office. Notices of allotments on each farm will be mailed prior to the referendum.

By law, in the absence of new legislation, the 1971 wheat crop comes under the provisions of the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended. This act requires that a marketing quota referendum applicable to the 1971 crop be conducted on or before August 1, 1970.

The Agricultural Act of 1965, as amended, extends its voluntary wheat program through the 1970 crop year, and specifically suspended marketing quotas for wheat producers only for the duration of the act.

Marketing quotas, to be put in effect, must be approved by two-thirds or more of those voting in

the referendum. If quotas are approved, producers will be limited to their allotment acreage beyond which they cannot harvest without a marketing quota penalty. Any excess acreage production would be subject to penalty unless it is sorted under bond. If

they remain within their allotment and divert the required acreage, they'll be eligible for price support loans and domestic wheat marketing certificate payments. If the referendum fails to carry, producers staying within their 1971 allotments and complying with other terms and conditions which may be prescribed by the Secretary, would be eligible for support at 50 per cent of parity.

More information concerning the wheat referendum will be mailed at a later date.

### Seasons Set On Doves, Et Al

The Wildlife Resources Commission has announced dates and bag limits for doves, marsh hens, woodcock, and Wilson's snipe for the coming seasons. The Commission was given the usual framework of dates from which to select the seasons on these species, but the bag limits were set by the U. S. Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife.

First shooting gets under way September 1 when the season on marsh hens opens one-half hour before sunrise. These come in for a 70-day season ending November 9 at sunset. Bag limits are 15 daily and 30 in possession for clapper and king rails, singly or in combination; 25 daily and 25 in possession for sora and Virginia rails, singly or collectively; and 15 daily and 30 in possession for gallinules. Shooting hours for marsh hens are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

Next in line is the dove season set to open at noon on September 2 with the first segment of a split season to close October 10, and the second season to run from December 16 to January 15. Again there will be a daily bag of 18 birds with 36 allowed in possession. Shooting hours are

from noon to sunset. Copies of the official regulations on the above species will be available at post office by late August. As indicated by the length of seasons and liberal bag limits, birds should be generally plentiful this year. The woodcock and Wilson snipe season will open November 14 and end January 16, with shooting hours from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Bag limits for woodcock are daily, 10 in possession, and for snipe 8 daily and 16 in possession. Woodcock hunters are requested to forward their names and addresses to the Wildlife Commission, P. O. Box 2919, Raleigh 27602, so that a survey of woodcock hunters and hunting can be made this fall by the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife.

#### ON NATIONAL DEBT

Figures show the government closed its books with the highest fiscal year-end debt in history. The Treasury Department reports the \$373 billion preliminary debt figure shows an increase over the \$357 billion of one year ago. Final tabulation is expected later in July.

### NC 4-H Congress Set

Delegates from the state's 100 counties will gather in Raleigh July 27-30 for the 1970 North Carolina 4-H Congress.

Some 1,400 Tar Heel 4-H members, their adult leaders and extension agents are expected on the North Carolina State University campus. The event climaxes another year of project work for the delegates.

Lyman B. Dixon, acting state 4-H leader, said the 4-H'ers will participate in a tight schedule of classes, contests, recreation, fellowship, tours and even politicking.

Among the featured speakers, according to Dixon, will be Norman Sloan, head basketball coach at N.C. State, and Karl Killsholm, an immigrant who lives in Algona, Iowa.

Sloan will speak Tuesday morning on "Merits and Challenges of Athletics." Killsholm will speak Thursday morning on "What Freedom Means to Me."

On Wednesday morning the delegates will attend one of several special interest classes. Among the topics to be discussed are how communists operate in the U.S., air and water pollution, drugs and car safety.

Among other highlights of the week are the Honor Club tapping ceremony Monday night, the Health Pageant Tuesday night.
