Albemarle Craftsmen's Fair Sept. 23rd. Through 26th

Persons who enjoy watching gifted craftsmen at work will have their chance at the Albemarle Craftsman's Fair, Elizabeth City, Sept. 23-26.

More than 50 adult craftsmen and artists from the Albemarle counties will demonstrate crafts ranging from pottery, ceramics and weaving to crewel embroidery, wood carving and copper enameling.

Craftsmen will work in their booths at the National Guard Armory event, each weekday from noon to 9 p.m. and on Sunday from noon to 6 p.m.

The annual fair is sponsored by the Albemarle Craftsman's Guild, Extension Homemakers clubs in the Albemarle area and the Elizabeth City Chamber of Commerce.

As an added bonus, the teen set, 19 years and younger, will be displaying their craft skills in a special youth section.

Another attraction at the fair will be garments worn by participants. Each person will wear

costumes of the 17th century honor of the 300th anniversary of the establishment of the Albemarle counties and the beginning of local government in North Carolina.

"Craftsmen in the Albemarle area stress quality workmanship," Mrs. Mamie Sawyer extension home economic agent, Camden County, points out, "so only high quality work will be exhibited."

From these crafts, started as hobbies, many persons have developed small businesses as thus increased the economic standards of the families as well as the area, Mrs. Sawyer observes.


