N. C. One Of Four States To Receive Special Funds

James W. Denning, North Carolina's Civil Defense Director, announces that the State is one of only four in the Nation selected by the National Office of Civil Defense to participate in a test program for posting signs at fallout shelters.

Under the program, local governments will be paid by Federal Civil Defense funds at the rate of Twenty Dollars per facility for marking shelters within their jurisdiction. No total is determined at this time but the amount of funds will be substantial with 59 counties and municipalities therein realizing funds in varying degrees.

Denning said, "We are delighted that our State was chosen for a program that will be beneficial to many of our counties, cities and towns."
