The State of North Carolina needs to spend over \$125 million on municipal waste treatment plant construction in the next 3-1/2 years according to the lastest estimates of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

EPA has made \$19,863,000 available to North Carolina communities for construction of waste facilities for fiscal 1971, for a total of \$72,801,392 since the Federal grant program was started in 1956.

The Environmental Protection Agency can, under existing Federal law, pay up to 33 per cent of the cost of N.C., municipal waste treatment

## Winfall Charter Revision Representative W.T. (Bill)

Culpepper introduced a bill in the General Assembly "To revise and consolidate the Charter of the Town of Winfall in Perquimans County' The bill as the title indicates
