New State Maps Rolling Off Press

The new 1971-72 state highway maps have started rolling into the State Highway Building and H. Boyce Midgette, state locating engineer, said a full truckload is scheduled to arrive later this week.

Printed in full color, the new map has on its outside cover a view of the North Carolina coastline as seen by America's astronauts. The back is covered with North Carolina scenes, printed in full color, and arranged so that they spell out the words "North Carolina".

Thousands of the maps are distributed annually by state agencies, with the Highway Commission and the Department of Conservation and Development sending out most of them. Midgette said the press run on this year's map exceeded 680,000 copies.

ON LOCKHEED PAYMENTS
Deputy Secretary of Defense David R. Packard says government payments to the Lockheed Aircraft Corp. from a \$200-million contingency fund to maintain production of C5A super transports will start next month. All 61 planes are expected to be delivered by February 1973.

Housing Loans Available

The Farmers Home Administration, under provisions in the Housing Act of 1949, as amended, makes and insures rural housing loans.

These loans are made to farmers and other rural residents including senior citizens who are 62 years of age and over. Now for the first time, residents of urban areas who plan to relocate in rural communities of under 10,000 population are eligible to apply for housing loans from the Farmers Home Administration, rural credit service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, according to Melvin E. Howell, local County Supervisor.

"Many families in cities want to move to the countryside but lack opportunity to obtain home financing," Mr. Howell said. "Loans may now be made to families who lack adequate housing and will become owner-occupants in a rural community, without regard to the location of their present residence or employment."

Howell explained that rural housing loans are limited to families who are unable to obtain financing from other sources. FHA rural housing loans may be used by individual families to construct a new home, to purchase an existing home, or to improve an existing home. Loans are made on terms of 33 years and the present interest rate is 7-1/4 per cent.

Persons interested in filing an application or obtaining additional information should contact the local FHA office in

their area. Offices are located in the County Office Building in Hertford, Melvin E. Howell, County Supervisor; at 308 Kramer Building in Elizabeth City, O. Waldo Winslow, Asst. County Supervisor; and in the Old Bus Station Building in Columbia, Phillip E. House, County Supervisor.
