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Postal Blues

There are growing indications Congress erred in cutting the Post Office Department free of the government making it a private corporation. Less than two months after becoming a private business, the Postal Service is in trouble.

Financially, the Service is about to ask Congress for money. It is about to curb some of Congress' free mailing privileges. It has embittered Congressmen by telling Postal employees, including postmasters, that they cannot answer Congressmen; that is to be done only by a special office. It wants to raise rates again.

into the award of a lush \$3.4 million contract to the Westinghouse Corporation for a job classification project; a House subcommittee has been told Westinghouse isn't suited to such a task and that firms specializing in such work made bids as low as \$1.9 million. And it's alleged a Postal Service official leaked the word the decision had been made to give the contract to Westinghouse some time ago.
