1040 U.S. Individual Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q) I want to clear out some of my old bank records, check stubs, cancelled bills and the like. Is there any need to keep these personal records for tax purposes?

A) Records should be kept as long as they are material in administering any Federal tax law. As a general rule, the IRS may assess additional tax or you may claim a refund within three years of the due date of a return. Therefore, any record you might need to support an item listed on your return should be kept at least three years.

Naturally, you will want to keep some records longer. For example, records on the purchase of a home or the acquisition of stock should be kept longer, because they will be needed for your tax return when the assets are sold or exchanged.

Q) Do U.S. citizens living in another country have to pay U.S. income tax?

A) U.S. citizens, wherever they are, are subject to U.S. tax laws. Under certain conditions, however, certain in-

come earned abroad by those who are bona fide residents of a foreign country or who are physically present in a foreign country for a specified period of time is not subject to U.S. tax.

Details can be found in Publication No. 54, Tax Guide for U.S. Citizens Abroad, available free by dropping a postcard to your IRS District Office.

Q) How can I get a copy of my 1969 federal income tax return?

A) Write the IRS Service Center where you filed your return. Be sure to include your name, address and Social Security number. The basic rate for reproduction of a document is one dollar per page.

Q) I don't understand the letter I got from the IRS. What should I do?

A) Contact your local IRS office and explain the situation to them. Identify the letter you received so that the person helping you can advise you what action may be necessary.

Q) I'm trying to determine whether I can claim my mother as a dependent next year. Do I count the Social Security benefits she receives in figuring if I furnished one-half of her total support?

A) Social Security benefits used by the dependent for her support during the year must be included in computing total support, even though such sums are tax exempt.

For example, if your mother's only two sources of support are you and Social Security, you would have to provide more than she gets from Social Security to meet the support test.

The Washington Way Of

Congress continues to observe the August recess. Much has been said about the antiquated system under which the legislative processes are handled in the Nation's Capitol. This includes criticism of the seniority system which invariably results in the older members occupying key positions.

In view of some complaints, the House has made an effort to make changes which at least insure a division of power among some of the younger members. In order to accomplish this, the House in January of this year approved a set of recommendations which were presented by a committee composed of members representing every geographical section of this country and including both younger and senior members.

The new rules stipulate that the chairman of a full committee may chair only one subcommittee of that committee, and that no Member can be chairman of more than one legislative subcommittee, and that no Member can be on more than two committees with legislative jurisdiction.

The results of these recommendations, while little noticed, have been far-reaching. Today, in the 21 standing committees of the House, no fewer than 113 Congressmen hold subcommittee chairmanships, an unprecedented distribution of legislative responsibility to more than 25 percent of the entire House of Representatives. This is an historic reform which will leave an imprint on our work as the new chairmen apply their energies and growing expertise to the problems within their

jurisdiction. So deeply did the change reach that one subcommittee, the Housing Subcommittee of the Committee on Veterans Affairs, is chaired by a Member serving his first full term in the House of Representatives, Charles Carney of Ohio. While the South continues to lead all regions with 49 subcommittee chairmanships, there are now 28 chaired by Members from the East, 22 by Midwesterners, and 14 from the West. Texas leads all States with 12 subcommittee chairmen, but is closely followed by Pennsylvania with nine, California with nine, and New York with seven.

It is hoped that this diffusion of leadership responsibility in the House will vitalize the entire legislative process.

On Thursday, August 26, I was honored in receiving a special invitation to attend an "Appreciation Rally" in Little Rock, Arkansas for Congressman Wilbur Mills, Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee. Approximately 35 Members of Congress were flown from Washington, D.C. for this occasion, and we were most impressed with the enthusiasm, large crowds and sentiment displayed. The Barton Coliseum was filled to its 10,000 capacity and another 12,000 gathered outside the Coliseum making it necessary for the entire Appreciation program to be repeated a second time for their benefit.

Although it was not officially announced as a "kick-off" rally for Mills as a potential Presidential candidate as has been speculated, the event was indeed indicative of the appreciation for and high regard in which Wilbur Mills is held by his people, and his growing popularity throughout the Nation.

Develop a new breed for termites that will eat anything made of plastic but get sick at the taste of wood.

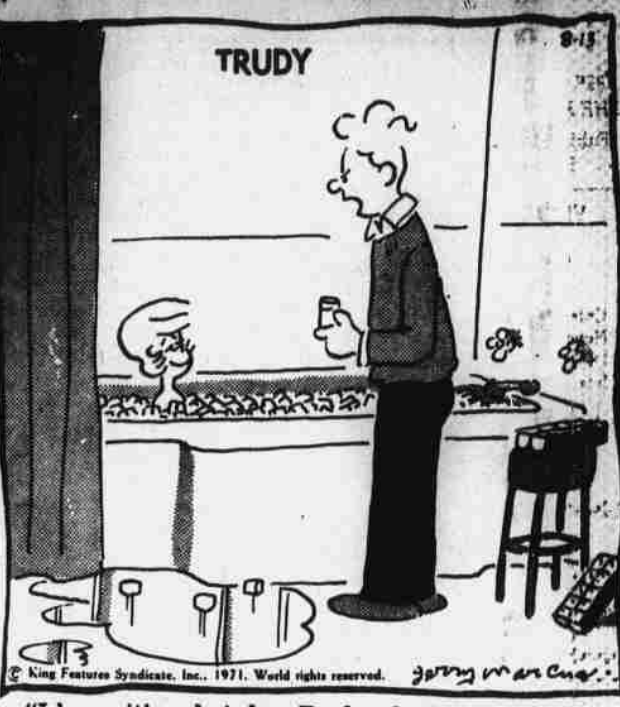
Breach a contract to bleach a brunette.
