Motorcycle Ace Zooms Over Cars

NEW YORK — "I've broken every bone in my body except my neck."

says daredevil Evel Knievel, who first hopped onto a motorcycle when he was 9 years old and is still riding tall in the saddle at the age of 32.

"It got in my blood," Knievel explains with a grin as he tells of how he has spent the past several years zooming his motorcycle over such assorted obstacles as a box of rattlesnakes, mountain lions, and a long line of parked cars.

For risking his life doing these high speed stunts, Knievel says he earns half a million dollars and more a year but adds "it depends on the year. Last year I didn't do too well because I broke my back twice and after that I got hit by a car while I was on my bike. That was a bad year."

Wearing a red jumpsuit, the husky, soft-spoken Knievel is quick to point out that his real name is "Robert." "Evel is a nickname," he laughed. "I guess

I was such a good little kid that everyone called me Evil and it stuck. But I changed the 'i' to an 'e' because I didn't like Evil."

After a life that included stunts in professional hockey, ski jumping, hunting and fishing trip guiding, and the insurance business, Knievel, a native of Butte, Mont., got into motorcycle racing after his Army service.

"I used to ride so fast that they'd put me in the back row and I'd still win," he grinned. He got out of racing and into stunt riding because "there's no money in motorcycle racing. It's one of the lowest paid sports in the world and you work twice as hard at it."

His specialty is jumping — getting the motorcycle up to a high speed, zooming up a ramp, and then sailing through space to land on another ramp that may be as much as 150 feet away.

"I've jumped a bike farther than anyone on earth — 150 feet, that's the record," Knievel says. To make this distance he has sailed his specially-built motorcycle — which can do up to 140 miles an hour — across a football field and also jumped 19 cars parked side by side, a feat which he says is "considered a world record."

"If you make a mistake," he adds wryly, "if say you're jumping 12 cars but you land short and crash into the 10th car then you end up in the hospital."

He observes matter-of-factly that "I've been operated on 30 or 40 times in the last five years and about 12 of them were major operations. Right now I've got a steel plate in my leg and another one in my arm."

In addition to hurtling over cars, Knievel once jumped his bike over a box of 50 rattlesnakes which was guarded by a mountain lion at each end.

Was he worried? "I get concerned sometimes," he says, "but I'm not afraid of anything."

A movie recently was made of Knievel's life story. "It's called 'Evel Knievel,'" he says. "It's based on incidents in my life. Some things are very, very true and others are fictionalized a bit to protect the guilty."

"George Hamilton plays me in the movie, but all the jumping stunts I do. They've got no stuntmen to double for me and they never will get anyone to do so."

Winner of Best Actress Award at Cannes Plays Role of a Young Heroin Addict

NEW YORK — It's a 10-1 bet the people in the restaurant didn't have the slightest notion they were having lunch next to the actress who had recently won the best actress award at the 1971 Cannes Film Festival — because Kitty Winn, who stars in "Panic at Needle Park," doesn't look the slightest bit like a movie star.

With her freckled face, wispy hair tied back in a bun, blue jeans and soft voice, she looks more like a girl fresh out of high school, which she isn't — she's in her mid 20's — and more like the daughter of an Army officer, which she is.

When she learned about winning the prize for best actress, she was in her hotel room at Cannes. "My younger sister was with me, and we had spent the whole day in the country with some friends," Miss Winn recounts. "When we got back to the room, I was lying on the bed, kind of thinking of packing, when a reporter who had interviewed me came to the door."

"He told my sister, in French that I'd won a prize, but she didn't understand," Miss Winn continues. "But he finally explained it was the Grand Prix. It was just lucky I was lying down so I couldn't fall on the floor."

"Panic in Needle Park" was her first film. She plays the part of a young heroin addict, and it was quite a switch from her last role, "St. Joan," with San Francisco's American Con-

servatory Theatre. "When I read the script, I knew nothing about heroin addiction," Miss Winn says. "My original response had to do with how irresponsible you are towards yourself if you take drugs. And then I started thinking about how you're also irresponsible to other people in that situation. The girl in the film takes drugs because her boyfriend is hooked and she senses his need for the drug is a lot greater than his need for her. She naively feels that if she takes the drug, they'll be together."

To help Miss Winn understand the role, Producer Dominick Dunne introduced her to a former addict from one of New York City's rehabilitation centers. After knowing her, grasping some of the problems that can lead to addiction and working in the film, the actress has come up with some conclusions of her own about drugs.

"First of all I learned I'm not interested in drugs. To me it's a nothing existence, and one has an eternity to be nothing," she says quietly. "I learned that their life is boring, and that the reality of taking drugs is much more horrible than the reality they have to face in this world. And it's a lonely existence — even lonelier than the one they left."

"At 16, kids may feel they have a few years to throw away," Miss Winn continues. "But it isn't throwing away a few years — it's throwing away a life."

Miss Winn's own life has been packed with good experiences

— travel — she has lived in Europe and the Far East; education — at Boston University where she studied drama; and acting in San Francisco. Intelligent and deliberate in her conversation, Miss Winn admits there are times when she thinks she doesn't want to be an actress, and it is, in fact, easy to see that Kitty Winn would much prefer just playing her own role rather than fulfilling anybody else's image of what a glamorous, prize-winning movie star should be.

Those Little Bald Spots

ALMOST every year in the spring a small patch of hair about the size of a half dollar falls out of my head. Could this be a vitamin deficiency or could it be caused by improper diet?

Dear Miss M.: The condition you describe is known as Alopecia (loss of hair) Areata. Almost always a fine gentle fuzz appears after a few weeks and before long the hair grows back normally.

The fact that it seems to occur only in the spring strikes me as being purely coincidental. I doubt that a vitamin deficiency can be the cause, assuming you are eating a normal diet.

Skin infection, especially caused by a fungus, emotional stress and sometimes even thyroid deficiencies may be causative factors. When people are given the reassurance that such localized baldness rarely extends and rarely is permanent, it tides them over until that strange welcome fuzz appears.

Why does a blow to the solar plexus knock a person out? I was hit by a basketball in a high school game and thought I was done for.

Dear Tim: Anyone who has boxed or engaged in contact sport appreciates the miserable sensation you describe.

The solar plexus is the spot where a large collection of nerves congregate just beneath the breast bone. A blow there may also knock out the breath by hitting the diaphragm that separates the abdomen from the chest.

I have always wondered how boxers can take such severe body blows and still survive. It is a testimonial to their excellent condition and to the protective muscles that they develop.

In order to be sure that no serious damage occurs in active sports, good protective equipment must always be used.

Have you ever heard the term Commando Operation? What could it possibly mean?

Mr. S. L., Mich. Dear Mr. L.: I don't know how the term came to be applied to surgery but such an operation does exist. In essence it refers to a very radical and courageous operation for the removal of an extensive cancer of the neck.

This daring surgical technique is responsible for saving many lives that might otherwise have been lost. Such surgical procedures on the neck are now performed with transplants of tissue to make speech and swallowing again possible.

TOP BRITISH WINE MEN LAUD CALIFORNIA WINES

LONDON — A select group of British wine professionals — the Institute of Masters of Wine — held the largest California wine tasting here this fall in this country, which has no important wine production. The results were "electrifying," commented wine authority Hugh Johnson, who said, "the top California wines rank with the top wines of the world, and the less-expensive, widely distributed wines are far above the standard wines of the world. If I lived in the U.S., I'd drink nothing but California wines."

The 50 different wines served came from all California's wine districts, which are handsomely illustrated in Johnson's new "World Atlas of Wine" Geoffrey Jameson, clerk of the Queen's wine cellar, commented on "the high quality and very great range and variety of wines at the tasting." Guests of honor at the tasting were Wine Institute President Harry G. Serlis, San Francisco, and U.S. Ambassador Walter Annenberg who "found the occasion most interesting, and it reinforced my convictions concerning the excellence of California wines."
