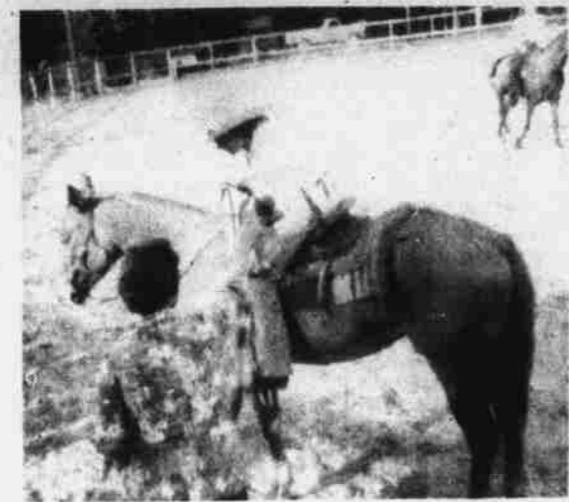
Students Earn Honors At Ncsu N.C.S.U.

More than one of every four undergraduate students at North Carolina State University earned Dean's List honors during the spring semester. Chancellor John T. Caldwell announced a record total of 3,084 men and women mastered studies in the sciences, technologies, humanities and arts to achieve academic excellence. In contrast, 362 students were suspended during the spring semester due to academic difficulties - a ratio of more than eight honor students for every suspension. To win Dean's List recognition, NCSU students must attain academic averages of 3.0 or better out of a possible 4.0. Chancellor Caldwell announced that two students from Perquimans County attained recognition for outstanding scholarship. Food Assistance

There were 903 low-income Perquimans County people on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Donated Foods program in March as compared to 928 the previous month, Russell H. James, Southeast regional administrator of USDA's Food and Nutrition Service, reports. Taking the state as a whole, James noted, there was an increase of 3,452 in the number of people on the food programs. The number receiving food stamps was up by 8,387 while the food distribution's total dropped by 4,935 to give an overall increase. In the food stamp program, operating in 53 North Carolina counties in March, 189,352 people were issued \$4.7 million in food coupons. Of this amount, \$3.2 million was in free or bonus stamps. This was about \$17 per person in free stamps, he added. The counties operating food distribution programs gave 114,426 needy people 3.7 million pounds of USDA-donated food.

Three Day Workshop Scheduled For July 11-13

There will be a three day craft workshop for interested Extension Homemakers Club members or non club members at East Carolina University, Greenville, N.C., July 11-13. This is a grand opportunity for adult 4-H Leaders, recreation center leaders, and Scout leaders to enroll in a learning experience to obtain skills, states Mrs. Paige L. Underwood, Home Economics Extension Agent. Leaders from 31 counties in the Northeastern and Southeastern Districts will be participating on a "First come first serve basis." From these classes and skills, many leaders branch out in home industries and increase their income by craft sales. There are 15 regular craft classes being taught by qualified instructors. Class enrollment is limited from 6 to 12 depending on the class needs for individual instruction. During the two evening sessions there will be special programs, demonstrations, and quickie activities. Select one regular craft class and one quickie activity from the following list. Select an alternate (second choice) in case classes are filled and notify the Extension Office by June 13. Regular Craft Classes—Copper Tooling, crafts for youth groups, creative needlepoint, creative stitchery, crocheted pearls, hairpin lace, hand-tied fringe, Italian hemstitching, macrame (beginning), Oshibana, pine needle craft, quilted pillow tops, reweaving, soft toy making, and wood-carving. Quickie Activities—Burlap flowers, beadwork, candle-making demonstration, candleholders from roofing tin, cornshuck flowers, decorative Christmas Balls from balloons, decoupage under glass - Demonstration, driftwood pins, forged foil, needlepoint pin cushions, pomanders, pressed cane chair seats, Santas from clothes pins, twist-top work box, and wire baskets. The cost for the workshop and lodging in Fletcher Dormitory will be approximately \$10.00, plus transportation and meals which will be available in the University cafeteria.

County ASCS News

CERTIFICATION OF CROPS PLANTED

Producers must certify the acreage of all crops planted on the farm in 1972 by June 20, 1972. This includes corn, peanuts, cotton, grain sorghums, oats, wheat, soybeans, rye and barley. This year the acreage and location of the set-aside acreage must be designated on a photocopy. Producers can begin certifying any time after all crops except soybeans have been planted which he intends to plant. Producers participating in the 1972 wheat program must certify their planted acreage for harvest by June 20, 1972.

DISPOSITION OF SMALL GRAIN ON SET-ASIDE ACREAGE

The final date for disposition of small grain, rye, oats, wheat, and barley is June 20, 1972. If you have any of the above grain that is to be left standing for reseeded on set-aside acreage, you must file a written application with the County Office before June 20, 1972.

SET-ASIDE ACREAGE

Set-aside acreage is to be cropland that would normally be planted to the crop being set aside in the absence of a program. The set-aside acreage must be cropland of average productivity for the crop being set aside. There will be a payment reduction for designating set-aside acreage below average productivity.

FARM PAYMENTS

Farmers enrolled in the 1972 set-aside programs on cotton, feed grain, and wheat will start receiving their payments on July 1. June 20 is the final date to certify crop and land use acreages under the 1972 programs. Data sheets on

participating farms are sent to New Orleans where the Data Processing Center computes the payments earned and prints out sight drafts and statements-of-payment computations. These sight drafts and statements are returned to the ASCS office for issuance to producers. The earlier producers certify the earlier we can process the data sheets and get the checks ready.

NON-PARTICIPATING FEED GRAIN AND WHEAT FARMS

Farms that are not participating in the feed grain and wheat programs must have 50 per cent of the feed grain base and 90 per cent of the farm wheat allotment planted in corn, wheat or soybeans.

Failure to meet this requirement will result in a reduction in the 1973 feed grain base and/or wheat allotment.

Producers may certify at the county office or a double post card will be mailed around June 20, 1972. The acreage can be entered on the card returned.

Arts And Crafts Course Offered At COA

A 2-week college credit course, Art 370G, Arts and Crafts, will be offered in Elizabeth City beginning Monday, June 26, 1972, by the Division of Continuing Education of East Carolina University.

It will be taught in three-hour sessions at the College of the Albemarle, Highway U.S. 17 North (beside Albemarle Hospital), each Monday through Friday evening through July 7, 1972. Each session will meet from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m.

Mr. Tom Evans will be the instructor for the course. Pre-registration for the course is desired. If the class is not filled by pre-registration, a student may register at 6:30 p.m. on the night of the first class meeting.

Art 370G carries three quarter hours of college credit which may be used toward teacher certificate renewal or for degree credit if the course fits into the student's degree program. The program should be valuable to all school teachers.
